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This year, 2018, marks the centenary of the end of the Gireat War and many of us will be preparing to mark this important anniversary in our Parish churches and at War memorials later this year. Of course, we know now that the longed for peace was quite short lived.

War is all around us and, even though its impact on most of us in Hampshire is not as acute as it was in the first half of the last century, we cannot avoid the images and news bulletins on our TV screens. Nor should we hide from the sense of global and communal responsibility these images provoke. As we prepare for this celebration in our churches and villages we pray for peace in the world, peace in our communities, peace in our families; places where love shines on us.

We are now in the season of church fetes; by the time you read this, Newtown Fete will be over and Soberton's will take place at the end of June. Income derived from our fetes generally keeps us afloat throughout the year. We record our thanks to those who organise the Fetes, and we give thanks for all those who attend.

At this point in writing I stopped to go to St Peters' Church to listen to a concert being performed by "Cantate" the Youth Choir formed by boys and girls from Portsmouth Cathedral – what a wonderful evening it was; we were transported with pieces from J S Bach, GI Faure, Brahms, Stanford, Vaughan Williams and others. The music was superb – the quality of performance by so many young people was incredible. If you weren't there you missed a real treat!

No doubt you will have heard of GIDPR (General Data Protection Regulation). This applies to churches as well as other organisations and commerce. The effect of these regulations which are now in place means that you must provide us with your consent for us to contact you about details of church services, and most activities undertaken in the villages. Giroups & organisations e.g. History Society, Lunch Club, Film Club and all the others are required to keep a record of your consent or maybe your refusal. Please help those who are attempting to comply with the regulations, by completing the required forms and returning them so that you are kept in touch.

We think of those young people revising for and sitting examinations at this time. We hope you do well. Coming shortly is Children's Week; we pray for those preparing for this, the children who will take part and the young people and adults who will supervise.

Summer holidays will soon be upon us. We remember all those who will go on holiday, we pray for safe journeys, relaxation and refreshment on return.

I repeat my invitation to you all to join us in our services at St Peter's and Holy Trinity in the coming months.

Keep safe over the holidays - my best wishes to you all.

Writing the annual report, I am always amazed about the number of adventures that we manage to cram into a year! We work hard to ensure that the girls are provided with a huge range of unique and stimulating experiences. This is what we have been up to over the past year!

During the Summer Term last year, we worked towards our Boomps-a-daisy badge. This involved making smoothies, playing games with cotton wool and vaseline, and learning and performing the special Boomps-a-daisy song. #### Newtown Church Fete 2018

It was touch and go with the weather at times, but the sun shone on the day and we had one of the hottest Newtown Church Fetes that we have had for quite a while. Not surprisingly we sold all 240 pints of Wallops Wood before 3.30pm and the Pimms tent had their best year ever!

Over 1,000 people paid at the gate and the lawn was thronging with people even before Tony Daykin from Radio Solent had officially announced that the fete was open. His opening speech was full of his usual panache and flair and the crowd cheered as the clock struck 2pm. Bargain hunters made a dash to be first in the queue for the plants, cakes, clothes, White Elephant, china & glass and produce stalls.

The fete was a resounding success with a gross income of almost £17,000 – that is such an incredible achievement for a small village community like ours, but it certainly doesn't happen without a great deal of hard-work and commitment. Behind every stall, there's been someone working hard to make, bake, collect or grow – plus someone to lift, shift and put up the gazebos and tents. 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# St Clair's Meadow Sub-committee Report

The public meeting to discuss plans by the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife trust for the newly acquired St Clair's Meadow attracted a large and enthusiastic audience to Soberton Village Hall on 26<sup>th</sup> March. The meeting was chaired by Parish Council Chairman, John Hyland, and Jane Masterman, Chair of the Liaison sub-committee.

Presentations by John Durnell, Director of Estates and Conservation for the Trust and Reserves Manager,



Jamie Marsh provided an overview of the Draft Management Plan which they said would remain dynamic and subject to change as the Trust's knowledge of the meadows developed.

They thanked the local community for its support and involvement in securing the meadows which they said were rich in wildlife and would, they hoped, be a valuable habitat for over-wintering wading birds such as snipe and lapwings. They also outlined their plans for access, grazing and environmental improvements to further enhance the meadow and answered many questions from the audience about the management plan.

Bad weather earlier in the year has slowed progress on fencing and grazing the meadow, but cattle will be introduced during the summer. Volunteer wardens have been recruited and will be keeping a watchful eye on the cattle and reporting back to Jamie Marsh and the St Clair's Reserves Officer, Chris Lycett. Meanwhile the Trust's conservation volunteers have been hard at work clearing scrub in preparation for the new fencing.

The meeting was closed by John Hyland who thanked HIWWT for their contribution to the evening and reminded those present that regular updates would appear in the Parish Magazine.

You can also direct questions or comments to HIWWT via the website's Contact tab. These will be forwarded by the liaison sub-committee to the HIWWT.

Volunteer wardens are also monitoring visitor levels at St Clair's Meadow, and the associated car parking, particularly over the May Bank Holidays. They have reported their findings - via this sub-committee - to the Parish Council which will discuss this further with the HIWWT.



## Family Pond Dipping - Sunday 10th June 2pm Soberton Village Pond

This is our annual survey of the village pond where you are warmly invited to come along, grab a net and help us check what creatures are living in the pond, which is at the junction of Heath Road and Chapel Road. Children must be accompanied by adults. Wellies and old clothes are recommended as people can get rather muddy and damp.

Helping us identify the creatures will be the SoberNewts' own pondlife expert, Dr Richard Osmond.

#### Soberton Down Work Parties

Over the past year we have been busy on Soberton Down with blackthorn and bramble clearance which is making a huge difference to this conservation area. A team of South Downs National Park volunteers have joined us on a couple of our work parties over the past few months and helped us make great progress. We look forward to a return visit in July. A small herd of Dexter cattle from Mark Black Farming also did great work grazing the site, supported by a small flock of sheep. Two ponies who moved in for a spot of extra grazing in April surprised us – and their unsuspecting owner - by turning into three with the arrival of a beautiful little foal. Do go up and have a look – dogs on a lead, please, because of nesting birds etc.

**Birds**: One of our team has been surveying birds on the Down and in the past weeks has seen 38 species of bird, including Hawfinches, a Red Kite, Greenfinches, which are not as common as they used to be, and a lot of Bullfinches.

**New Volunteers** – we need more help with the many practical tasks required to keep our local sites of environmental interest in good shape.

We have a core team of 7 or 8 people who work on Soberton Down on Tuesday mornings from 9am with occasional reinforcements when other members have time. But we also need volunteers for work parties to manage the village pond, help Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust with woodland management of East Bere Copse (Fay's Wood) and other occasional jobs. ### 75 years ago...

.... on 9th July 1943 Operation Husky, the Allied invasion of Sicily, was launched. Under the overall command of US General Dwight D Eisenhower, the operation was intended to strike at the 'soft underbelly of Europe'; to divert German forces from the Eastern Front, to undermine the Italian-German Axis and to relieve pressure on Allied forces in the Mediterranean, that were being harried by Axis aircraft based in Sicily. Two Allied Armies were landed: the British 8<sup>th</sup> Army with the 1<sup>st</sup> Canadian Division under General Sir Bernard Montgomery and the US 7th Army under Lieutenant-General George S Patton. The operation was a complete success but at a cost: 5.750 Allied and 9,000 Axis personnel were killed with 15,700 Allied and 46,000 Axis wounded. Crucially the operation resulted in toppling the Italian leader Benito Mussolini, Italy's surrender and the invasion of the Italian mainland.

This year commemorates the centenary of the formation of the Royal Air Force on 1<sup>st</sup> April 1918 through the merger of the British Army's Royal Flying Corps and the Royal Naval Air Service. Hitherto military flying had evolved along partisan lines and the RAF, under a new Air Ministry, sought to improve efficiency by coordinating aviation procurement and reducing inter-Service rivalry. The RAF became the first independent air force in the world and, with 290,000 personnel and 23,000 aircraft, its most powerful. RBL Droxford & District will be celebrating the RAF's centenary at a Summer Drinks Party on 14<sup>th</sup> June and at its annual dinner on 8<sup>th</sup> October. The Station Commander and officers from RAF Odiham will attend both occasions. Anyone who is not a branch member but who would like to attend should contact the Secretary (see footnote below). The next meeting to which non-members are invited to attend will be at 1900 on Monday 10<sup>th</sup> September at Droxford Village Hall when Rear-Admiral Chris Parry CBE PhD will talk about 'Admiral King and Grand Admiral Raeder', leaders of the United States Navy and Kriegsmarine during the Second World War.

The Allied invasion of Sicily and, subsequently, the Italian mainland was a compromise. With the Soviet Red Army the only major element of Allied land forces actively engaged in fighting Nazi Germany in mainland Europe, pressure from Stalin was increasing on Churchill and Roosevelt to open up a second front. The Americans favoured invading occupied France but this required a massive buildup of troops and materiel in Britain, which would take time. With memories of the carnage of the Great War still fresh, the need to minimize risk of defeat and unnecessary slaughter was paramount (although, ironically, infantry casualties in Italy were to exceed those suffered in other theatres). This is where attitudes between the totalitarian dictatorship in the Soviet Union (and to a lesser extent Nazi Germany) and the Western democracies differed; the Soviets were prepared to sacrifice over 20 million citizens defeating Germany - more than 20 times the combined losses of their Western allies across all theatres. Also, despite Roosevelt's policy of 'Germany First', some of us senior military commanders still saw their priority as defeating the Japanese in the Pacific. In the end Churchill's compromise worked; saving face to an extent with Stalin, precipitating the collapse of the Italian/German Axis, reducing pressure on Allied naval and air forces in the Mediterranean and eventually diverting nearly half-a-million German troops to Italy.

#### HAMPSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL report to Soberton & Newtown Parish Magazine - 14th May

#### Dear Resident

In addition to these monthly reports in the Parish Magazine I also visit local Parish Councils regularly and give them an update on items relating to events at Hampshire County Council. I also prepare an annual report for each Parish Council which acts as a review of the past year. Hampshire County Council covers 1,500 square miles with a 2016 population of almost 1,400,000 people so there is always a lot going on. With that in mind, I have reproduced in this newsletter some of the key points from my annual report to



local Parish Councils, which I hope will give you some background to the challenges and achievements of the past and forthcoming year.

#### Population

- Hampshire is the third most populous County [after Kent and Essex]
- It is less densely populated than the South East as whole [3.7 people per hectare compared with 4.7 per hectare]
- The population is set to increase by a further 7.5% to 1.46 million by 2023
- Hampshire is ageing faster than the rest of the UK.
- Between 2011 and 2016 the population aged 65 years and over grew by 17.9%
- Young people [aged 0-19 years] make up 23% of the population
- The population of those people aged 85+ years is forecast to increase by 28.9% by 2023, to 54,000
  people

#### Health in Hampshire

- · Obesity remains a key issue. One in four Hampshire adults is classed as obese
- Childhood obesity levels double between reception year and year 6
- In Hampshire 22.8% of 4-5 year olds are obese, that is higher than England at 22.1%
- · Secured European funding to work with partners to improve men's mental and physical health
- Nationally, just over three out of four suicides [76%] are by men and suicide is the biggest cause of death for men under 35 years
- Produced a Suicide/Postvention Protocol for Hampshire Schools and Colleges
- An estimated 24% of Hampshire population drink at above the safe recommended levels for alcohol each week. This represents around 257,000 people, or one in five people. Around 40,000 people in Hampshire are classified as "high risk drinkers" or dependent upon alcohol.
- HCC commissioned an Alcohol Nurse Service in QA Hospital and Southampton Hospitals
  - It has been estimated that around 1 in 3 people over 65 and 1 in 2 over 80, fall each year. In Hampshire
    this equates to approximately 95,000 people over 65 years falling each year, of which 40,900 are over
    80 years old
  - Age related macular degeneration rates are higher in Hampshire than England; smoking and obesity [poor diet] are significant factors

Revenue Budget of £2.0 billion [2018/2019] including -

- £860 million for Education
- . £628 million for Social Care and other services for children and adults
- £143 million for highways, transport, economic development and waste disposal

Plus a capital programme of £540 million over three years [2018/19 - 2020/21] for extra-care housing, additional school places and new schools

#### Financial Challenges -

HCC's total general grant loss since 2010/11 has been £219m.

- Reductions of a further £140 million are required by 2019/20 to meet anticipated grant reductions and additional pressures from, for example, social care and the National Living Wage.
- 2018/19 adult social care pressures are £23 million. The 3% adult social care precept from Council Tax will raise an extra £17m.

#### Council Tax 2018/2019

- For 2018/19 HCC increased Council Tax by 5.99% (including 3% for Adult Social Care) but we still have the second lowest council tax of any county council.
- HCC froze Council Tax for five years prior to 2016/17. Had Council Tax gone up with inflation, it would be nearly £100 more than it is for 2018/19 even with the 5.99% increase.

#### **Primary School Performance**

- Hampshire 66% of pupils meeting expected standard in reading, writing and maths
- England average 61%

#### **Secondary School Performance 2017**

Pupils achieving Grade 5 or above in English and Maths GCSE

- Hampshire average 45.5%
- National average 39.6%

#### **School Admissions**

#### **Primary School Admissions 2017**

- 91% of children in Hampshire were offered a place at their first choice primary school.
- 98% were offered a place at one of their preferred schools.
- England average (2017) 90% of children received an offer of their first choice school and 97.7% at any of their preferences.

#### Secondary School Admissions 2018

- 92% of children in Hampshire applying for a Year 7 place were allocated a place at their preferred school.
- 98% were offered a school of their choice.
- England average (2017) 83.5% of children received first preference and 96.1% received an offer of a school of their choice.

#### Highways

- Over 5,500 miles of road are maintained by the County Council.
- HCC investing more than £10 million annually on planned maintenance for roads in Hampshire
- Additional £3 million 'pothole fund' recently awarded by central government for flood resilience and pothole repairs.

#### **Other Information**

- Extended the meals on wheels service to include young adults [those with learning, mental health issues or physical disabilities]. Afternoon tea is now an additional option for users of this service.
- Almost 1,800 people presently receive Meals on Wheels, and 35,000 lunchtime meals are delivered each month in a £16 million contract.
- HCC has over 500 maintained schools
- Agreed to give £1 million to WCC for the new sport and leisure complex
- Maintains over 133,000 street lights and 4,300 miles of pavements
- Maintains 5 country parks

Abbey Gardens will be hub of the event and is also the starting point for the family ride. Participants will set off on the Criterium route at 9.45am before the main races begin at 11.00am.

# LEADER funding available to support rural enterprise

Rural businesses are encouraged to apply for grant funding from the Fieldfare LEADER Local Action Group (LAG) to support projects that will create jobs and boost the local economy. Farmers, foresters, growers, rural businesses and rural communities have until the end of August 2018 to bid for a share of a £1.6million fund across the East Hampshire, Eastleigh & Winchester areas.

The Fieldfare LEADER programme is delivered in partnership with Winchester City Council, Eastleigh Borough Council, East Hampshire District Council and the South Downs National Park Authority. The Eighteen71 Café has been awarded silver accreditation from– Winchester Area Access for All (WAAFA) which is a scheme assessing accessibility in Winchester area. WAAFA is dedicated to improving general access and wheelchair access conditions for people in the Winchester area with physical or sensory impairments.

#### Council asks public to be 'dragons

A new business innovation fund is being launched by Winchester City Council this week, giving members of the public the opportunity to vote on which innovative business ideas the council should fund. The fund is aimed at small businesses located within the Winchester District. It will focus on innovation and the creation of new business ideas. services and projects - and the awards will be in the region of £1,500 per business. Businesses have until 30 June 2018 to apply by completing an online application form and providing their business plan and cash flow forecasts. They will then produce a three minute online pitch to market their innovative idea to the public. Winchester City Council residents and businesses. will vote over the summer for the ideas they would like to fund, with the final decisions being made in autumn.

#### <u>GDPR</u>

On 25 May, the EU General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) replaced the data protection legislation across Europe. In the UK, there will also be a new Data Protection Act which will cover some data protection matters that are not included in the GDPR. The new laws modernise data protection and privacy law by giving new and improved rights to people and placing more obligations on organisations who hold your personal data. The emphasis is on privacy, accountability and transparency. This means that we have to tell you more about how and why we use your personal data, who we share it with and how long we keep it for. We also have to give you more information about your rights and what you can do if you are not happy with the way in which we hold your personal data.

Most of the time, Winchester City Council will only collect and hold information about you so that we can carry out a statutory function (such as collecting Council Tax), provide a service to you (such as emptying your bin) or to fulfil a contract or agreement with you (for example where you are a tenant of Winchester City Council). Sometimes, we will have to ask for your consent to use your information; however, where we do need your consent, we will always explain why and will give you easy ways in which you can withdraw your consent.

We will always ensure that we keep you personal data safe and that we do not share it with other people or organisations without your explicit consent unless the law requires or allows us to do so. We do not sell your personal information to other organisations (with the exception of the Electoral Register which the law requires us to make available for sale).

If you have any queries about how we handle your personal data, or on the rare occasion that we don't get things right, you can contact the Council's Data Protection Officer who will work with you to try to resolve any problems. You can contact our DPO in writing or by email: legalwork@winchester.gov.uk We will be updating the data protection and privacy pages on our web-site over the coming weeks.

#### Winchester District Gypsy, Traveller and Travelling Showpersons Development Plan Document 'Traveller DPD'.

Submission under Regulation 22 of the Town & Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012

Winchester City Council has submitted the Winchester District Traveller Development Plan Document to the Secretary of State on the 9 May 2018. A statement of the availability of the Traveller DPD and its key supporting documents is attached. The Submission Traveller DPD is not published for consultation and its content is unchanged from the Publication (Pre-Submission) Plan which was subject to consultation in January/February 2018, although the Council has prepared a schedule of suggested modifications. The DPD will now be considered alongside the comments made on the Pre-Submission version by an independent Planning Inspector through the Examination process. Information on the Examination hearing dates and location will be posted on the Council's website when available.

The Inspector will decide which matters he/she wishes to examine and who will be invited to appear at the Examination hearings. A Programme Officer has been appointed to assist the Inspector and will contact those invited to participate in the hearing sessions of the Examination. However, anyone can attend and observe the hearing sessions. Any communication from or with the Planning Inspector and regarding the hearing sessions will be dealt with by the independent Programme Officer.

# More than 50 MPs have called on the government to do more to improve 4G coverage in rural areas.

Some 56 MPs have signed a joint letter to digital secretary Matthew Hancock asking him to challenge the current speed and ambition of 4G coverage roll out. They are calling for a  $\log \pi^{2}$  binding obligation for all four major operators to ensure mobile coverage across 95% of UK geographic landmass by the end of 2022.

The government estimated that achieving this ambition would add £75 billion to UK GDP. The letter has been signed by 56 MPs from parties including the Conservative Party, Labour, Liberal Democrats, the Scottish National Party and Plaid Cymru. It has been co-ordinated by the All Party Parliamentary Group for Rural Business, which is chaired by Julian Sturdy, MP for the York Outer constituency.

#### Not good enough

While people inside 90% of UK premises can make telephone calls on all four mobile networks, this falls to 57% in rural areas, according to a recent Ofcom Connected Nations report. Mr Sturdy said: "This is just not good enough and progress in connecting the countryside has been painfully slow.

"We are asking the Secretary of State to step in and work with Ofcom to ensure that the mobile operators speed up delivery of 4G to rural areas."

The move follows a Country Land and Business Association report that mobile operators have been failing to submit applications for new masts in rural areas with the worst 4G coverage. CLA deputy president Mark Bridgeman said people living and working in the countryside had been disadvantaged by poor signal and mobile 'not-spots' for too long.

#### 'Abandoned'

"It is clear that the mobile operators will only make the investment needed to connect the countryside if they are forced to do so," he added. While many rural communities seem to have been abandoned by the mobile operators, these 50 MPs are making sure the rural voice is heard. The MPs' joint letter calls on the government to ensure that Ofcom works towards the delivery of universal quality mobile coverage. It also calls for a significant change in transparency rules that enable mobile operators to refuse to tell communities where and when they plan to roll out coverage.

# More Industry associated with Soberton Parish

It should not be a surprise given the names of several locations in Newtown to realise that brickmaking was carried out here. Kiln Hill, Clamp Farm and Clamp Kiln Farm are obvious clues. As long ago as 1678 when William Gisby, Senior made his will he was described as a brickmaker, twenty three years later another member of the Gisby family made his will, not a common occurrence in those days. It suggests that brick making was quite lucrative, and also important enough to be given as their main occupation.

For over a century from 1740 the Pafford family were brickmakers. In 1741 John Pafford is known to have occupied 'a good dwelling house, garden, brick kiln, two acres of inclosed land, two forest plots and four acres of meadow'. There are leases in 1748 & 1755 of brick kilns, the liberty of cutting furze etc. in the walk called Charles Wood in Bere Forest. Furze, or gorse, would have been used for the firing of the kilns. In the census of both 1841 and 1851 a William Pafford's occupation is given as a brickmaker. In the latter census he was a 61 year old widower living at Charles Wood. (NB this represented a larger area than today since six properties – including two farms and would almost certainly have included Clamp Kiln).

Then a new name occurs, William Lotam, or Lotem, or Loten, (spelling has not been standardized). William was both farmer and brick maker. In the 1841 census William Loten, formerly of Hambledon, lived at Clamp Brick Kiln. In the 20<sup>th</sup> Century the Lay Family carried on the industry in Newtown, it was neither continuous nor carried out by them. Sometimes a Mr Clinch, stayed with a family member at Nightingale Cottage just for the period of brick making but he did become a resident . The trade directory of 1935 has an entry for Build-O-Bricks Ltd., brick and tile makers at Clamp Kiln. it is understood that operations ceased on the outbreak of WWII. When an older property just beyond Newtown School was pulled down in the late 1960's or early 70's the pupils had first hand experience of digging for and moulding clay.

It may be more surprising to learn that in 1859 that William White's trade directory mentions a large chemical works at Mislingford where naphtha and acids are manufactured by Messrs. Gale and Savage. These names belong to Soberton Mill. This enterprise would need a good supply of running water and possibly the collaboration with Soberton Mill was more than a working relationship. However, the 1859 Post Office Directory, possibly more reliable, lists Charles Pink & Co. Manufacturers of Naphtha and Vegetable Acids at Ford Works, Newtown. The site of the chemical works seems to have been lost but was evidently in the Mislingford area. The 1841 census names two young mechanics staying at The Roebuck, neither Hampshire men. Ten years later on census night the guests included an engineer from Yorkshire, two copper smiths, one of whom was from Yorkshire and a young bricklayer from London. Was this a coincidence or were they working on the new project?

Possibly the pumping station built in 1907 for the Gosport Water Works Company was on the site of the former chemical works. Although not exactly an industry the new building with its machinery and chimneys inspired the master of Soberton School to arrange a visit for some of his older boys soon after its opening.

During the latter part of the 1930's two friends decided that there must be a market for waste farm and animal products. Chicken farmer Mr. Jones and John Cole set up a Soberton (or Hampshire) Guano Company assisted by Archie Cole. The two brothers went into the army in 1939 and Mr. Jones carried on the business until they returned. The Local History Society was fortunate to secure some of the business ledgers and has a photograph of the buildings
