

PiNS Report

As always, I would like to express a huge thank-you to everyone who contributed to the PiNS Christmas Card this year. We have exceeded all expectations and raised an amazing £725 which will be spent on improving the fabric of Newtown and Soberton.

Many will be aware that the Fingerpost has been missing, for many years, from the junction of Liberty Road and Kiln Hill since a tree crushed it. With the support of a £1,000 grant from Cllr Patricia Stallard and another from the Parish Council we have now commissioned a brand new sign to replace it at a cost of £3823. Thanks to good old Google Street View we have also been able to see what the original sign said so that the details can be replicated.

Some suggestions that you sent in with your donations were:- "Soberton signs into the village showing river, church etc." This was something that has been discussed at Parish Council in the past and it was felt that there are so many roads entering into the village there would have to be several and, on our narrow lanes, that they could hamper grass and hedge cutting. "Preserving the telephone boxes"; again this is in hand with the Parish Council and ideas are still being sought for an appropriate use for those that no longer house telephones. "The Newtown sign near Dradfield Lane to be cleaned"; this will be addressed as part of the ongoing programme of repairs and maintenance that the funds we raise are designed to do. "A road sign for Martins Corner" this is in the remit of the County Council, I have passed this request on to Vicky Weston who has the request in hand. Dog waste bins have been suggested but, of course, someone would have to empty and clean these bins and dispose of the waste. More bulbs around the villages have also been requested and I think once Openreach have finished their cable laying and the verges have, hopefully, been reseeded we can assess where bulbs can best be planted. Any volunteers would be welcome perhaps for next autumn when we can purchase bulbs in bulk.

St Clair's Meadow Sub-committee Report

Consultation on Draft Management Plan to start soon

Thank you to those of you who have sent the subcommittee your views and comments to be considered by the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust (HIWWT) as it prepares its Draft Management Plan for the water meadows.

If you visit St Clair's Meadow you will notice that HIWWT have installed signs indicating that it is now in their ownership as a Nature Reserve and that there is no access to the southern end of the site. Visitors can access the northern half of the reserve.



Other proposed changes will be included in a draft plan which is expected to be published early in February 2018 on the Parish Council website at **www.soberton.org**, There will be a one month consultation period during which you will be able to comment on the HIWWT's proposals.

To read the draft plan, click on the **St Clair's Meadow Consultation** tab (under the photo). The site also includes instructions on how to send your comments to the sub-committee for forwarding to HIWWT.

The HIWWT will present the completed plan for the meadow at a

Enforcement is always a hot topic for councillors, and we want to reassure you that as councillors we attach great importance to the protection and enhancement of the natural and built environments of the District, and this is what council does through the planning process. The Government has made it clear through legislation and guidance that the response to breaches of planning control is a matter for the discretion of the local authority. To justify enforcement action there must be 'harm' arising from the development. Officers have to decide if that is the case and what is the likelihood of action being taken against the council and incurring a financial penalty and therefore they need to make that decision on what action can be taken, and when. Below are some points that help explain what is and is not a breach of planning control.

What is a breach of planning control?

A breach of planning control occurs when operational development (building or other works) or a material change of use of land or a building takes place without planning consent. Examples of breaches of planning control are:

• Not building in accordance with approved plans (following the grant of planning permission);

• Failing to comply with conditions attached to a planning permission;

• Carrying out development which is not permitted because an Article 4 Direction has been made;

- Unauthorised works to listed buildings;
- Unauthorised demolition within a

conservation area;

• Unauthorised works to trees subject of a Tree Preservation Order or in a conservation area;

• Engineering operations, such as the raising or lowering of ground levels and the formation of earth bunds, carried out without the benefit of planning permission;

• Display of an advertisement without the

benefit of advertisement consent;

• Failure to properly maintain land so that it affects the amenity of the area;

• Failure to comply with a S106 legal agreement/undertaking;

• Unauthorised building works or changes of use of buildings or land;

• The formation of a new access or the alteration of an existing access onto a trunk road or a classified road (an A, B or C class road).

Matters that are not breaches of planning control

Examples include:

• Internal works to a building that is not a listed building;

• Obstruction of a highway or public right of way;

• Parking commercial vehicles on the highway or on grass verges;

• Parking caravans on residential driveways or within the curtilage of domestic properties as long as they are incidental to the enjoyment of the property;

• Operating a business from home, where the residential use remains the primary use of the property and there is no significant impact on residential amenity or the character of the area;

• Boundary or land ownership disputes – these are a civil matter and cannot be controlled by planning legislation;

Covenants imposed on property Deeds;
Any development that is deemed to be 'permitted development' under the Town and Country Planning (General Permitted Development)(England) Order 2015 or in any statutory instrument revoking and reenacting that Order, i.e. where it does not need the permission of the Council; For more information please see the enforcement pages on the website http://www.winchester.gov.uk/planning/plan ning-enforcement

Dealing with Winter Weather



Throughout the year, Hampshire Highways completes ditch clearing and maintenance work on Hampshire's 60,000 gullies and 4,600 catchpits, as well as carrying out a continued programme of structural improvements to the highways drainage system to make Hampshire more resilient to the effects of extreme weather.

New Electric Vehicles

A new electric delivery van and pool car based at Bar End, Winchester, will cost 97% less to 'fuel' than equivalent diesel vehicles. The County Council is also reviewing which other vehicles in its 156 small vehicle fleet could be replaced with electric equivalents – which could save £210,000 every year.

The Council has already saved nearly £30 million in energy costs over the past seven years after cutting its carbon emissions by 38.1% since 2010. The local authority has now set a more ambitious target to cut carbon from 40% to 50% by 2025. Electric vehicles could also save an estimated 400 tonnes of carbon emissions, helping the environment and delivering cleaner air for Hampshire residents.

School Dinners

The Council has agreed an increase of 15p for a two course school dinner. This will come into effect from September 2018 and will bring the price per meal in line with those charged by many other local authorities, as well as the Department for Education's funding for free meals, which is set at £2.30. In the last school year, HC3S, the County Council's award winning catering business, cooked and served over 14 million school meals in Hampshire's primary and secondary schools.

Help with paying for childcare

Financial support is available if you and your family meet certain criteria. Free Early Years Education (EYE) is also available to some two, and all three and four year olds in school nursery classes, state or private nursery schools, day nurseries, playgroups or pre-schools and with approved childminders. There is also other support for children with special educational needs and disabilities. Visit the Hampshire County Council web page [https://www.hants.gov.uk/socialcareandhealth/childrenandfamilies/childcare/ payingforchildcare] to find out more, including universal credit and help if you are in education.

Adoption and Fostering 'web chat'

Deciding to apply to adopt or foster a child is a big step, and it's important that all the information and advice people might need to make a decision is easy to access. Hampshire County Council's new "web chat" service makes it easier to get in touch with adoption and fostering specialists quickly for information, or arrange a call back.

During office hours, people can opt to begin a live, online 'chat' with an adviser if they would like to ask questions about adoption, including their potential eligibility to adopt. There are more than 40 children in the care of Hampshire County Council who are waiting to be adopted. There is a particular need for

adopters who feel they could give a home to sibling groups, or a child with disabilities. HCC provide support for adopters and the new additions to their families, and our Adoption Support Team of social worker specialists is on hand for as long as needed.

Anyone over 18 who has a spare room and some personal or professional child care experience can apply to adopt a child, whether an individual or a couple. To find out more, please call 0300 555 1384.

New Assault Course

A new assault course has been opened at Hampshire County Council's Queen Elizabeth Country Park. The free facility is part of the Armed Forces Covenant funded Forts and Fleets project, which also includes a new dog activity course, adventure play area and outdoor community space at the County Council's largest country park near Petersfield.

Proposed improvements in and around the existing visitor centre funded by the County Council are due to be completed in 2019, including a bigger catering offer with more seating, a flexible hall for indoor events and for hire, better car parking and improved landscaping and shelter in the courtyard. The County Council and partner organisations are also investing in new or improved visitor centres and play facilities at Lepe Country Park in the New Forest, Royal Victoria Country Park at Netley, Staunton Country Park at Havant and Manor Farm and River Hamble Country Park at Bursledon.

New Year's Resolution?

If you are concerned about your body weight why not take up this offer? Almost 7 in 10 of Hampshire adults are overweight or obese and the cost to the NHS in Hampshire in managing diseases related to obesity is estimated at almost ± 340 million per year! The County Council has commissioned a new self-referral service for people aged 18 years and over. If you are a resident in the administrative county of Hampshire, or are registered with a Hampshire GP and have a Body Mass Index [BMI] of 30+, or don't know what your BMI is but think you might qualify for this **free service**, call 0345 602 7068and quote WWRS095. People who qualify will be offered a free tailored service and will aim to lose not less than 5% of their body weight.

Walking and Cycling

Walking is simple, free and one of the easiest ways to get more active, and become healthier. The County Council has six beautiful country parks [see https://www.hants.gov.uk/thingstodo] plus Titchfield Haven National Nature Reserve which are the perfect places to stretch your legs. Regular brisk walking helps to improve performance of the heart, lungs and circulation, lower blood pressure, and reduce the risk of coronary heart disease and strokes. It can also help to reduce stress levels and promote a sense of wellbeing.

Did you know? It is recommended that adults do at least 150 minutes of moderate physical activity per week. The recommendation for children is at least 60 minutes every day, and preferably more.

To help with ideas of where to stride out and stay fit and healthy, visit the Walking for Health website [see https://www.walkingforhealth.org.uk/] which offers more than 1,800 free short walks every week. These walks are easy to get involved with, especially if you have an existing health condition and want to keep active.

Newtown School:

January 11th Nellie Horn absent, tonsillitis. Leslie & Dorcas Crook excluded - impetigo January 14th Heavy fall of snow, four children assembled in morning and seven in the afternoon. January 17th Snowy morning again. Twenty-two children in the morning and twenty-five in the afternoon. The average on the register was about eighty. April 4th Lily Cleeve and Winnie Ford are attending every afternoon the Cheese Making Classes held in the village during the stay of the Hants Travelling Dairy School. May 8th Children had a holiday for Ascension Day. They assembled at 9 30 and went to church, afterwards they had races and sports on the Vicarage lawn May 24th Empire Day. The children assembled at 10 and sang patriotic songs, saluted and marched past the Flag. At the salute were Mrs. Garnett, (Woodend House), Mrs. Pearce, Miss Westbrook. Also present Miss Amy & Master Charles Pearce, Miss Janet and Master Peter Norton, The Vicar and Mr. Holmes. A holiday was given for the rest of the day. The flagstaff had been presented to the school by Squire Carpenter-Garnier of Rookesbury Park and the flag by Mrs. Garnett. June 14th The Middletons have been excluded for these past two weeks with chicken pox, one or two others cases are now appearing June 21st The Medical Officer of Health advised closing of school 56% attendance. School closes for Summer holidays. Summer holidays were usually taken at strawberry picking time so that children could help in the fields rather than at harvest time. August 5th School re opened, fair attendance. An extra week was necessary (6 weeks) as the children were not able to attend school so soon. Ten children are still away by order of the doctor. September 6th School closed on Tuesday for Autumnal weeks holiday, two extra days were granted as Headmistress and Miss Lobb were inoculated by the Medical Officer of Health September 16th. School reopened, "2 ³/₄ cwts. have been despatched of blackberries during the past week" October 14th. Influenza prevalent, 24 children assembled in morning. School closed until 1st Nov November 11th School reopened after four weeks closure. Children were not well enough to return on 4th Nov. and another week was granted. Miss Lobb was one victim.

Considering the date of this last weekly entry one wonders if the head teacher, Miss Horwill, was not aware of the Armistice or was she strictly abiding by the rule that the log book was for events that affected the day to day running of the school. There are very few references featuring the conflict. Two children were taken by Mrs. Garnett to the Red Cross Hospital at Fareham to visit wounded soldiers and took gifts of eggs in October 1915 and a few days later a visitor to the school took in 'a map of the War Area in Europe'.

Soberton School:

Soberton School, perhaps due to having a male head, was more attentive and at one point recorded in the log book that 10 minutes each morning was 'devoted to news from the front'. The girls made articles for the troops and concerts were held in the schoolroom to provide funds for the Red Cross and other organisations. The fact that a former pupil was a victim of the HMS Bulwark explosion in December 1914 may have made for more awareness. A few months later Harry Smith wrote that a Roll of Honour listed 27 lads serving with the colours.

At the end of October 1918 the Soberton School was also affected by the influenza and had to be closed. However they had returned by November 22nd when 'Special lessons on the Armistice were given and the Upper Division fully posted up with topical events e.g. German Fleet surrender'.

75 years ago...

.... On 2nd February 1943 the last German troops in Stalingrad surrendered to Soviet Union forces. With his 6th Army surrounded by Russians, and ammunition, fuel and food exhausted. Generalfeldmarschall Friedrich Paulus formally surrendered on 31st January. Of some 280,000 German troops in the city, 90,000 were taken prisoner and 40,000 (mainly seriously wounded) were evacuated by the Luftwaffe; the remainder, about 147,000, had been killed. Of the prisoners, most perished in captivity with only 5,000 survivors returned to Germany - the last in 1955. Soviet losses (killed, wounded or captured) during the campaign exceeded 1 million while Germany and her Axis allies (Romania, Italy, Hungary and Croatia) lost nearly 628,000.

EGION

The Battle of Stalingrad and the Battle of the Atlantic (to be commemorated in the next edition) were the two key turning points in the Second World War against Nazi Germany. The former paved the way for the Soviet Red Army's advance through Eastern Europe and its subsequent conquest of Berlin in May 1945, while denying Germany access to essential oil supplies. The latter, in countering the U-boat menace, enabled the massive buildup of US troops and materiel in UK and North Africa for the liberation of Western Europe and the ultimate German surrender; it also enabled the supply of vital war materiel to Russia via the Arctic convoys.

Despite the failure of Operation *Barbarossa* (the invasion of the Soviet Union), German forces had captured huge swathes of Eastern Europe, including Ukraine, Belarus and the Baltic states - establishing a front between Leningrad (now St Petersburg) in the north and Rostov in the south. A significant proportion of the German 6th Army's strength comprised troops recruited from captured states which, on balance, preferred Nazi to Communist domination. The capture of Stalingrad (now Volgograd) was considered both symbolic - it bore the Soviet leader's name (the rather less than avuncular 'Uncle Joe' Stalin) - and strategic in that it could pave the way to the control of vital oil fields. It would also impede US support to Russia via the Persian 'corridor' and enable control of the River Volga, the largest river in Europe and a vital communications link between central Russia and the Caspian Sea.

As Napoleon Bonaparte had discovered 130 years previously, military campaigning in Russia can be hampered by the massive distances involved, inhospitable terrain and extreme winter weather conditions. Germany, with the finest army in the world, found herself logistically overstretched whilst pitched against a nation prepared to sacrifice unlimited numbers of her people to repulse an invader. Indeed, unarmed civilians at Stalingrad – men, women and children – were expected to follow in the wake of advancing troops with instructions to take up the weapons of those killed or wounded. The NKVD (Soviet security police) in the rear ensured these instructions were observed. Meanwhile, Paulus was under strict orders from Hitler to hold Stalingrad 'to the last man' with his encircled army resupplied by air until reinforcements could be sent. With little more than 10% of the minimum daily requirement reaching the embattled 6th Army, lack of food and ammunition would finally lead to its defeat and surrender.

Simple changes in design can help those with dementia stay in their homes for longer.

If you or someone you care for is living with dementia, you may be wondering if there are some practical things you can do at home which will make life easier.

Things you can change at home:

- Let in as much natural light as possible
- Minimise shadows as some people don't go near dark places
- Purchase an alarmed automated pill box
- Install smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors
- Consider labelling switches for on/off
- Mark the edge of each step or sharp edge with a contrasting tone as some find it difficult to establish depth

Important things to remember:

- Not all the changes will work for everyone
- Involve the person with dementia as much as possible
 - Don't make unnecessary changes
 - Don't wait until the last minute
 - Seek advice


