After all the wet and miserable weather over the last months, I am sitting in my study with the sun shining through the window and my mood has been uplifted by the sunshine.



News From the Pews (of St Peter's)

New Vicar Appointed

Great news. The Reverend Andy Davis, who previously served as the Rector of Bishops Waltham, has been appointed Priest in Charge to minister to the new expanded parish. This, as announced in the last parish magazine, will consist of Newtown, Soberton, Hambledon, the Bridge parishes and Swanmore. His previous knowledge of the area will help him bed down the new organisation.

Reverend Andy will be licensed on 19th February 2024 and the plan is for him to be based in Swanmore with "house for duty" priests accommodated in the other local vicarages/rectories. These incumbents will minister at Sunday services and spend 2 days a week on other parish duties.

Harvest Festival

The church looked lovely for the traditional Harvest Festival service which took place on 8th October. It was followed by a delicious lunch in the Church Room. Perhaps news of the super food had got out – the service was well attended!

Remembrance

This year's Royal British Legion service was held at the church of St Mary and All Saints, Droxford. It was well attended with plenty of participants from both Soberton and Newtown. Droxford School and the Girl Guides presented wreaths in addition to those of the Legion and the Parish Councils.

After the church service in Droxford short services of commemoration were held at both the Soberton and Newtown War Memorials. These were led by Norman Chapman the Last Post was sounded prior to the 2 minutes silence and this was followed by the traditional lament "Flowers of the Field" played on the bagpipes by Ollie Thomson. Both the Parish Council and Royal British Legion laid wreaths which will remain for the

vear as a reminder of our continued thanks for the sacrifices made on

our behalf.

Thanks also to Mrs Elizabeth Parker for the beautiful floral arrangements based around poppies in St Peter's.

New Memorial in St Peter's

Many readers will be familiar with the "Twynam Memorial" in St Peter's. The brass plaque records the tragic loss in the First World War of 4 brothers and a son in law of a local family (whose descendants remain in the village).

The wreath which used to hang above this most moving memorial has been replaced by a frame containing 5 of the ceramic poppies which formed part of the display at the Tower of London in 2014. It is a fitting, more enduring and very personal reminder of their sacrifice.

A buzz of enthusiasm at the Soberton and Newtown Climate Café

There was a vibrant atmosphere at Rookesbury Hall on 21st October as residents gathered to chat about living in Soberton and Newtown over tea, coffee, and biscuits. On four different discussion tables around the themes of food, transport, energy and waste prevention, personal experiences were shared on a whole range of issues, including transport problems in a rural area, difficulties with recycling hard plastics, what to do with surplus food or how to make old houses more energy efficient. The lively conversations resulted in many positive and creative ideas and solutions to consider for our area in the future.



Several local 'green experts' were on hand to get the discussions started, including Cllr Danny Lee (Winchester district councillor), Stuart Mills from Winchester Action on the Climate Crisis (WinACC), Dave Morton from Winchester Food Partnership and Nigel Foster from Hambledon Greening Campaign. People were, also, invited to vote for what they considered to be the priority area of concern for our villages as well as their favourite project ideas that other groups in the district have undertaken (see some of the results below).

A big thank you to everyone who came along and contributed to the success of the event and thank you to Soberton Parish Council for support and funding.

At a follow-up meeting, the hope is to form a group and, having looked at all the ideas from the event, to decide on one or two local projects to get us started. 



Who are the 3Ps?



Local History ... Meeting Places

During the next few weeks some of you, many I hope, will be meeting up with other Soberton inhabitants at one of the meeting places within the parish for some Christmas or seasonal event in time honoured tradition.

For centuries St. Peters Church would have been the only public meeting place suitable for the whole family and it wasn't just used for religious purposes. Many of the traditions, albeit most based on religious days, took place wholly or partly within the church grounds.

By 1850 there was a church at Newtown built due to an increased population particularly in the southern half of the parish and there was also a Methodist Chapel at Soberton Heath. However, they were places for worship, they were meeting places still but one feels they may have lost the 'fun' element. We can probably blame the Victorians for this wave of religious fervour and the idea that churches were ultra serious places where one behaved 'very proper' and spoke in whispers unless of course taking part in prayers and hymn singing. Sundays were holy days, church or chapel days, when children were expected to attend not only Sunday School but services with their parents.

Times have changed. The Methodist Church is now a private house, St. Peters and Holy Trinity share services with Hambledon but they play a different role. Concerts, coffee mornings and other events make them once more meeting places for the community.

The other traditional meeting place within the parish was the inn or public house although this was very much a male preserve. The White Lion, The Bold Forester and The Roebuck have long histories. There was probably an inn on or near the Church Green long before the White Lion existed where the occasional visiting trader or administrator was housed. The fact that in 1564 the plague appeared in the house of one Twynam who was a victualler. The inn would have had its own brewery and would, over the centuries, have provided the Church with the traditional Church Ale and ale for wakes.

The Bold Forester had a blacksmiths shop alongside, the publican also the farrier, so useful when waiting for a horse to be shod.

The Traveller's Rest although no longer functioning had a long life and was very popular with its skittles and darts teams. The Station Hotel, later The Hurdles, was built when the Meon Valley Railway opened in the early days of the 20th century. Being opposite the station it was a convenient place to rest whilst waiting for a train or a carriage, later a taxi, to carry travellers to their destination. Although being a hotel it attracted visitors exploring the Meon Valley as messages on old postcards suggest.

The High Street had at one time or another, three public houses or beer houses. The oldest was probably the Cock and Bottle, later Yew Tree Farm and then became The Buttery. At the junction of Selworth Lane and the road to Taplands Corner stood the Falcon. Midway between was the New Inn. These three were definitely licenced premises but perhaps just for beer. Two public houses on the heath, The Plough in Forester Road and The Royal Oak, were probably beer houses.

The high-principled Victorians were very anti these latter establishments where they considered working men spent too much time and money to the detriment of their families and to their employers if they were unfit to work the next day. To be fair to the men where else could they socialise after a hard days work. The typical farm workers dwelling was certainly not suitable especially if they had a large family. Some might have a garden or a few an allotment where they might meet in good weather but a beer house with a good fire would have been much more attractive.

The answer to the beer house was the Working Men's Institute and Reading Room, this fitted in with the other belief of Victorians, that of self improvement. Both Rookesbury and Soberton Village Hall had their roots in this belief. When Soberton School outgrew its premises on the bank in the High Street and moved to a new schoolroom in Upper Street, (now School Hill), the old school building may have been used as a barn or remained empty. The new young curate, the Rev. Morley, probably earmarked it as a potential meeting place but first he had a church in a very neglected state of repair to attend to. Once that was attended to the Morley family set about raising at least £50 to "putting in order" the old schoolroom and in 1892 the Coffee and Reading Room was officially opened and in the evening a Temperance Meeting was held there. A collection of two pounds and eleven shillings went towards the outstanding debt of twelve guineas. There was a bar but it sold coffee and presumably other soft drinks and it is documented that the 'library' held three hundred volumes as well as newspapers, magazines etc.

It is not clear how long the 'coffee' part of the title lasted but by 1904 it is being referred to as The Soberton Reading Room, run by a committee chaired by the Rev. Morley and with Mr. Putman as secretary. An advertisement states "The Reading Room is open every night for young men from 6pm." There are monthly social "At Homes" with concerts and talks to which 'visitors from Newtown and neighbourhood' were sometimes invited. The flowing year a ten-day course on butter and cheese making took place there. Ladies must have been allowed to use the Reading Room and not just when they were needed to see to refreshments at socials.

Over time, the Reading Room functioned as a village hall but retained its name as Soberton Reading Room but as the structure deteriorated and the parish population grew a new village hall was urgently needed and the Reading Room was sold in the mid 1960's. The last edition of the parish magazine featured Tony Evans who was instrumental in seeing the new Soberton Village Hall materialised.

Newtown's meeting place had a similar although slightly later start. It was in the spring of 1891 that the inaugural meeting took place at the instigation of Rev. Edward Allen, Vicar of Newtown, and the Rev Rashleigh of West Lodge. Rules for membership were drawn up and it was open to men over the age of seventeen with an annual subscription of four shillings. Twenty-one men joined and Rev Allen became chairman with Mr. Page, the Newtown schoolmaster, its secretary. The Rashleigh and Allen families appear to be heavily involved and I think may have been responsible for providing many of the books that were donated and possibly a little dated. Maybe it was Miss Allen's influence that made it possible for ladies to use the library although they were not permitted membership until much later.


As well as the educational aspect men were able to play cards, draughts and bagatelle. Unfortunately, the room of the original house, known as Hawthorn Cottage, was too small for the cues to be used correctly and Miss Allen paid for an extra room, with two rooms above, to be added to the house so that the game could be played and a piano housed there. Concerts occurred at regular intervals so that whole families could be entertained. The Reading Room flourished, particularly during the winter months but outgrew the premises.

In 1914 Mr. W. Stares purchased the piece of land from Mr Bollen the grocer adjacent to his shop. (Now Wick House) for a new meeting place. The hall was built with local help and completed before the First World War took many young men away from the village. For some years it continued to be run on a membership basis and under that umbrella there were several different sub groups or activities the most important being the billiards. Billiards was played in an additional room to the main hall. Originally there were outdoor toilets and basic lighting within the hall and billiards room. Electricity and running water were not available until mid 20th century. Towards the end of the 20th century the hall committees had to turn their attention towards the demands of the Disability Act and for Rookesbury this meant a complete reconfiguration of the building.

Both halls are now flourishing with a wide variety of activities due to the time and care given voluntarily by dedicated people who deserve the thanks of the whole parish.




In the Garden ... December / January

The wet autumn has delayed many garden tasks, such as planting bulbs, trees and shrubs. If you have bare rooted trees waiting to be planted make sure that the roots don't dry out, either by heeling them into the ground or potting them up until they can be planted.

Early December is the last chance to plant most spring flowering bulbs and you may still have to give the lawn a final cut.

some cases, sowing seeds.



Vegetables Sprouts, leeks and winter cabbage can be harvested but keep the vegetable plot free of weeds and debris that can shelter pests. If you have not already done so you can still sow broad beans suitable for autumn sowing.

Prepare the site for next year's runner beans by digging a trench and incorporating some well-rotted manure and shredded paper before replacing the soil. This will retain moisture in the soil and hopefully avoid the need for watering when the crop is developing.

In January first indoor sowings of early cabbage, cauliflower and lettuce such as Little Gem can be made.

Fruit Cut back newly planted bushes and canes of soft fruit such as raspberries, blackberries, gooseberries and red currants.

Carry out winter pruning of established apple and pear trees and soft fruit bushes, currants and gooseberries. But do not prune stone fruits such as cherries, peaches, and nectarines, plums and damsons in order to avoid fungal attacks such as silver leaf and canker.

Herbaceous border Now is the time when you can cut down the old flowered stems of perennial plants such as Rudbeckia, Echinacea, Michaelmas daisy, phlox and golden rod.

Do not be tempted to cut down penstemons as they can be vulnerable to frosts if the crown of the plant is left unprotected; leave it until late April to do this job. Divide and replant larger clumps of perennials.

Trees and Shrubs Prune Wisteria and shrubs grown for their foliage colour such as Sambuca and Cotinus. Prune deciduous trees to shape.

Plant bare rooted roses, if you have not already done so. Cut back very tall buddleia, roses and lavatera by about a third to avoid wind damage over the winter months. Final pruning should be delayed until spring.

Protect roots of tender perennials such as canna, dahlia etc. that have been left in the ground to overwinter with well-rotted manure or coarse compost.

In the greenhouse Take care of overwintering plants by keeping them fairly dry, clearing up all fallen leaves and dead flowers, and keeping a constant watch out for pests and diseases, particularly fungal rot and mildew.

January is the time to sow chillies and peppers, which need a long growing season.

Remembrance Service 12/11/2023

The Royal British Legion (RBL) organised the Remembrance Service at St Mary and All Saints Church, Droxford. The Parish Council was represented by myself and Cllr Salmon, with Cllr Buttriss the standard bearer for the RBL. Following the service of Remembrance wreaths were laid at the War Memorial in Soberton High Street and at the Lychgate, Holy Trinity Church Newtown. These ceremonies were attended by members of Droxford RBL, with the bugle played by Jan Zawada and bagpipes played by Olly Thomson. In addition, it was nice to see a number of members of the public attending each of the ceremonies.

Planning Applications

As noted in the last Parish Magazine the Parish Council are a consultee on all planning applications. The PC's planning group comment on applications when appropriate, everyone can view planning Applications you just need the address. If you want to search quickly for a planning application then these are the links:

Simple Search (winchester.gov.uk) Simple Search (southdowns.gov.uk)

Just type the address in which you are interested in the box and press search.

Once you have viewed an application it is simple to make a comment either positive or negative.

Planning Enforcement

If you are concerned that activity is happening on a site or land which doesn't have planning consent you can report this to the Enforcement team on either the Winchester CC or South Downs National Park via their websites. After a report the Enforcement team will view the site, check the planning history, advise if there is a breach of planning and if they need to take further action.

There are a number of Enforcement actions across the Parish, some of which from the outside look as if nothing is happening however, in most cases legal work is being progressed. This takes time as the enforcement and legal teams most follow the correct processes to ensure a positive outcome. If you have any queries on a particular site, email the Parish Clerk

who may be able to assist, or if not, send an email directly to the appropriate planning authority.

Parish Design Statement (PDS)

The next stages to progress the PDS will be to analyse the responses from the consultation and then commence the writing of the document. There will be further consultations and announcements as the process moves ahead. Everyone's input is welcomed, please speak to/email the clerk if you are interested in assisting.

Soberton Heath Recreation Ground and Children's Play area

The Parish Council has been looking for some time to improve the facilities on the Recreation Ground. Councillors are looking at a Sport England's grant to renovate the playing surface in order that Soberton United can return to their home ground and encourage further youth teams to use the facilities. The Children's Play area is due an annual inspection at which time the PC will consider the work required, albeit repair or replacement of equipment and possible cost.

Hedges

The PC reminds those who are responsible for roadside hedges to prune them this autumn/winter. This action is both good for the hedge encouraging growth, and clearing sightlines allowing road users, riders, cyclists and walkers better visibility, making our roads/lanes safer for all. It is particularly important to clear hedges around the traffic speed limit signs (including the small repeater signs) in order that road users are reminded of the speed limits. If you are struggling with this work or to contact a specialist contractor our clerk may be able to assist, contact email clerk@soberton.org

Ditches and Culverts

Open ditches and culverted must be maintained to avoid upstream ponding, we've had a considerable amount of rain in the past two months. On-going maintenance will prevent unnecessary flooding and the damage that may cause. Road drains are maintained and cleared by the Hampshire County Council Highways team; you should report blocked road drains directly to HCC.

Sewage Systems (private drainage)

As previously noted, we all have 'private drainage' to deal with our foul water discharge albeit a cesspit, septic tank or a small treatment system. It is our individual responsibility to avoid an overflowing system which is both bad for the environment and our health.

South Downs National Park Authority (SDNPA) Local Plan Review 2023/2024

The PC has completed and uploaded to its website (www.soberton.org) a questionnaire called the Planning Priority Statement (PPS) for the Parish of Soberton. The PPS was approved at our October PC meeting. The PPS was required to be completed by the end of October, by all parishes who are within or partly within the National Park Authority (NPA) area. It

should be noted that only areas within the National Park will be reviewed. The PPS will not replace the PDS in any way - it is to help the NPA with their Local Plan review for the National Park area which is being carried out during 2023/4.

The benefits of autumn leaves and winter survival

Carpets of colourful leaves are one of the signature signs of autumn, as deciduous trees prepare for the long winter ahead. Whilst they may be done with their leaves for the time being, other wildlife is busy taking advantage of this new leafy blanket.

Leaf litter (which is made up of fallen leaves, small twigs, seeds, and other woody debris) provides a variety of species with a warm, safe place to shelter from the elements with.

Hedgehogs use leaf litter to build their nests. They spend the winter hibernating, surviving off their fat reserves. During this time their breathing will slow, and the heart rate and body temperatures will drop, and leaf litter will provide essential warmth to help them survive the cold. Depending on the weather, hedgehogs will emerge from March onwards.

Common toads also rely on leaf litter and will spend the majority of winter living under a blanket of deep leaf litter, conserving as much energy as possible. They re-emerge for the mating season in early spring, migrating back to the pond in which they were spawned to reproduce.

Whilst some species of butterfly, like the painted lady, may migrate here in summer, others stay with us year-round. They overwinter in their egg, caterpillar, pupal or adult form depending on the species. During winter, leaf litter provides the perfect place to remain concealed until the spring. The most common way for butterflies to spend their winter is as a caterpillar, some will even continue to feed whilst its mild, but as temperatures drop most will enter a temporary state of dormancy known as 'diapause'.

As well as warmth, leaf litter also provides an important source of food for detritivore and decomposer species. Both are incredibly important as they help break down the leaf litter and recycle nutrients back into the soil.

Detritivores, such as woodlice, ingest and digest decomposing plant matter such as fallen leaves. Closely related to crabs, lobsters and shrimp, woodlice are mainly active at night and breathe through their knees! There are thirty different species of woodlouse in the UK including pill, common rough and common shiny.

Decomposers, such as fungi, directly absorb nutrients through chemical and biological processes. One of the most recognisable species to find at this time of year is the amethyst deceiver. These bright purple fungi should be easy



to spot against the red and brown leaf litter that it loves to grow in.

Woodlands are the ideal location to discover trees going through this change. Find your nearest Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust woodland reserve on the Trust's

Nature at home – Don't tidy your garden


Autumn is traditionally the time to tidy up your garden, but leaving your garden messy can have a range of benefits for nature and wildlife.

Instead of sweeping up or burning fallen leaves, it's much better to let them decay naturally. This feeds the fungi and micro-organisms in the soil and recycles nutrients into the grass and trees. If you do clear areas of your garden, pile the leaves into heaps so they can decay naturally. These will also offer places for wildlife to hibernate.

Don't be too tidy with your flowerbeds either. Deadheading everything removes valuable resources; seed heads provide food for small birds and shelter for insects.

Think ahead to the possibility of freezing weather – float a football in your garden pond to prevent it becoming totally frozen and allow oxygen to circulate.

Set against our local changing climate there is a backdrop of many national, and international challenges which don't need any expansion on here if you are following the dismal News headlines. We perhaps need many more effective human anthropologists to fathom out the best way forward for a harmonious world without conflict — what a challenge!

From a local perspective, all we can do as Councillors, is to find the best enablers for solutions to our problems closer to home.

There is no better place to start than with the key challenges for our Nature emergency, which are highlighted in the latest 'State of Nature' report, using the latest and best data collated by the incredible work of thousands of skilled people, most of whom are volunteers. Thankfully, the value of nature, including its role in tackling climate change, making our lives better and the need for its conservation among the public and policymakers alike is now getting higher visibility. The full report is available from www.stateofnature.org.uk.

In September 2023, Winchester Council declared a Nature Emergency with a number of resolutions to be taken forward alongside an updated district Carbon Neutrality Action Plan. The similar call to action from South Downs National Park (SDNP) can be read at www.southdowns.gov.uk/south-downs-national-park-responds-to-state-of-nature-report-with-a-strong-call-to-action/

Thankfully, Planning is also catching up with these much-needed actions to address the Nature crisis. In January 2024 the much-vaunted new planning Biodiversity Net Gain regulations will apply to all new developments – including solar farms - so that a project leaves biodiversity in a better state than before.

Some other current and future enablers to enhance our quality-of-life which readers may wish to know about are listed below:

 Water and Sewerage - Southern Water Five-Year Business Plan has been submitted to Ofwat. It includes a £7.8 billion programme with major improvements in water resilience, wastewater treatment, and customer service, as well as enhancement and protection of our precious environment. Ofwat will publish their final determination on the submission in December 2024. This may mean higher water bills, but most vulnerable customers will be protected with up to 45% discount on bills. - Waste processing Changes are being proposed that will significantly increase household recycling and reduce waste across the district. Brilliant news for our ambitions of becoming a greener district. Please contribute your views to the surveywww.winchester.gov.uk/recyclingsurvey

New Parking Arrangements

From the 1st October 2023, responsibility for the onstreet parking enforcement returned to Hampshire County Council from Winchester City Council. This



now means that all aspects of on-street parking, across Hampshire, are now under the direct management of the County Council, as the Highway Authority.

On-street parking enforcement will continue, but the frontline enforcement staff, known as Civil Enforcement Officers [CEOs], will be employed by a specialist parking services provider, NSL, working in partnership with the County Council. CEOs won't be constrained by district or borough boundaries.

Residents are now able to report a parking contravention, apply for a disabled parking bay, arrange parking suspensions and pay a Penalty Charge Notice, all via the County Council's Parking pages on the HCC website: https://www.hants.gov.uk/transport/parking

Reading Challenge

More than 19,000 Hampshire children signed-up for this year's Summer Reading Challenge - up 11% compared to 2022 - and read over 73,000 books.



Renewed commitment to Hampshire's Armed Forces

Hampshire County Council has underlined its commitment to the Armed Forces, by renewing its



pledge that serving and veteran members of the Forces, and their families, are treated fairly and are not disadvantaged when accessing public services such as education and healthcare.

The County Council was selected some 12 years ago to be among the first to sign the Armed Forces Covenant, because of its strong track record and significant beneficial work it does with its military partners. Hampshire has a historic and long-standing close relationship with the Armed Forces and has military facilities from all three services. Some 72,000 households in Hampshire include someone who has served in the UK armed forces.

Armed Forces Personnel and their families can find other sources of support through the County Council's Armed Forces.

Future Plans

In the face of one of the biggest budget shortfalls in its history, the County Council must close a £132 million funding gap by April 2025 - the result of years of underfunding of local government services by central Government, rising costs from inflation and growing demand for core services like social care for vulnerable children and adults. Proposed budget measures could start to see all non-essential spending being withdrawn after April 2025 and the Council limiting future spending on just the delivery of minimum service levels, required by law.

The full County Council accepted recommendations on proposals, at its meeting on 9th November 2023 and some options will be subject to further, more detailed public consultation in the New Year.

Pick your Top Three School Preferences

Hampshire parents and carers with children due to start school in Reception Year or move to Year 3 at a junior school next year, can now apply for their child's school place for September 2024. School applications are open until 15th January 2024. Parents are being reminded to name three schools on their applications, to give them the best chance of being offered a place at one of their preferred schools Parents can apply online –

Residents Hosting Ukrainian Families

Hampshire County Council has recently announced that it will be paying an extra £200 per month to all Hampshire residents hosting Ukrainian guests as part of the Government's Homes for Ukraine Scheme, until the end of March 2024. This takes the monthly payment to £700.

Conservation Funding to save UK's Rarest Orchids

Hampshire County Council has secured a £98,000 funding boost to help rare helleborine orchids to thrive. The conservation project aims to create protected habitats for the endangered plants at sites in East Hampshire.

The chalkland areas of the East Hampshire Hangers and nearby woodlands already provide a home to some of the UK's scarcest helleborine orchids, but their numbers have been in decline. This project will put in place measures to protect these fragile locations and nurture the threatened helleborine orchid back from the brink of extinction. Conservation work such as this is a key priority for the County Council enabling us to preserve our precious natural landscapes for wildlife, develop resilience to climate change, and ensure that the delicate ecosystems can spread and survive.

The Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust will take part in the project focusing on orchid preservation at a nature reserve east of West Meon. Last June, the County Council was appointed by the Government to prepare a Local Nature Recovery Strategy' for Hampshire, including the areas of Portsmouth and Southampton. The aim is to work with organisations and communities to improve the environment, protect wildlife, and combat climate change, now and in the future.
