
We also said goodbye to Rev Andy Davis on his retirement. We are now in the process of the recruiting process for a new Priest in Charge for the Meon Valley Parishes.

This year the Church Flower Team was kindly invited to take a stand at The Village Fete to raise money for the Flower Fund. The proceeds help buy flowers for the main festivals at Christmas, Easter & Harvest as well as for other significant occasions. British Flowers and sustainability were the theme. Some of the flowers were purchased from a British Grower with the majority coming from people's gardens in the village.

Our thanks are extended to all those who made it possible; **Sue Smith** and **Wendy Pragnell** for providing us with a stand with enough shade to protect the flowers from the bright sunshine; **Anne & Ben Stoneham** who gave us permission to pick from their extensive Cutting Garden; **Gilly Hill** with her beautiful walled Garden and **Alison Willis** for her amazing hydrangeas. Not forgetting our own Sandra who lovingly grows flowers and foliage that she regularly harvests for the church for weddings and festivals throughout the year. And finally, to those members of the Flower Team who helped us both before and on the day



Our approach to flower arranging in the church is having to change. 'Oasis' the Floral foam used in most flower displays has become a serious environmental problem contributing to the growing issue of microplastic pollution. In January 2020 The Royal Horticultural Society announced it was banning the product and since 2023 it hasn't been used in RHS shows. This means that designers, including those at The Chelsea Flower Show have had to find alternative methods to create their displays. The Church of England is also coming under pressure to ban the use of floral foam however this is yet to happen. As the pressure mounts it may well be only a matter of time?

So, what does this mean for church flower arrangers? There are several sustainable alternatives such as chicken wire moulded inside a container to hold stems in place,

'kenzans' floral frogs (metal devices with spikes) or a grid of waterproof tape on top of a vase.

The use of floral foam has not been banned, and professional floral designers and amateurs can still use it but we believe we need to make changes. We appreciate that this might be more difficult for some than others. But even if some of us adopt the sustainable approach it will help make a difference. St Peter & St Paul's at Hambledon have already moved away from the use of floral foam in their displays and we believe we should follow their lead.

If you are interested in flower arranging and have time to spare, then do please come along and join us. Simply contact either Sandra or me. We look forward to welcoming you to the team and to making a difference.

FAREHAM / Pond-clearing project will culminate in scientific confer

Ups and downs of our Village Pond

Few childhood memories match the magic of pond dipping – peering into a net to discover the fascinating creatures trawled from the depths. You only have to look at this magazine's cover to see the spell cast on young and old alike at our recent annual pond survey.

But there are important scientific reasons for pond dipping, too. Every year we use the family pond dip to check on the bio-diversity of the pond which provides vital clues to water quality and the natural balance of species.

Alarming events such as the algae which made the pond a "no go" area in 2024 and the fish deaths earlier this year have quite rightly caused concern, but they are part of a pattern of natural reactions to climate and increase in fish population and require careful management.

Ponds can dry up through extreme heat – as Soberton Pond did in the hot summer of 1976 when locals rescued and rehomed some of the aquatic life – or can clog up with invasive vegetation and disappear, as almost happened in 1998 when farmer Danny Bower towed a massive raft of parrot feather weed out

> of the pond with a Land Rover. Local residents followed up with a clearing operation (see left).

The near extinction of the pond on that occasion was the trigger for the formation of the Soberton and Newtown Conservation Group which has worked with the Parish Council ever since to manage the pond with regular clearance of invasive weed and surveys of its wildlife.

We were relieved that our 2025 survey in June

revealed a healthy diversity and increased numbers of certain invertebrates - most likely due to the reduced fish numbers.

And that is why we discourage people from

introducing Goldfish and Carp to the pond. They have voracious appetites and prey on the young of the pond's natural inhabitants such as dragonflies, beetles, river snails and Caddis flies.

We also ask that the No Fishing sign is respected as lost equipment poses a hazard to wildlife and people working in the water and scattering bread to attract fish upsets the water's nutrient balance.

We all enjoy the pond and its natural beauty and are grateful to residents who keep us posted about any concerns. It is a precious resource and would soon disappear without all our efforts and vigilance.

Guides support Chalk Streams

We see a lot in the news about how polluted our rivers are. They are full of chemicals, sewage, and agricultural run-off. Meaning 80% of the countries rivers and water ways are not in good ecological shape.



But not here. Not the Meon - Right?

As we all know the River Meon is a chalk stream, but did you know it is one of only (around) 200 chalk streams in the whole world. Surely you would imagine that such a precious environment would be protected? Well, legally, it's not.

Unfortunately, our beautiful River Meon is not as healthy as we would imagine. Reports have consistently shown that our precious chalk stream is suffering. A report from the Environment Agency shows that the River Meon contains higher than acceptable levels of Mercury (don't worry this isn't going to hurt you unless you are an invertebrate) and will not recover until 2063. Chemically the water quality is not good, and Biodiversity is lower than would be expected.

Even with the reintroduction of water voles along many stretches (including St Claire's), and the return of otters, our river is still not happy. But these are not problems we can solve on our own; legislation and tighter controls are needed to make sure that damage is not being done when no-one is looking.

A government report from 2022 outlines targets to get 70% rivers and water bodies back to healthy by 2030, however, they are already behind. Citing a lack of funds due to a lack of interest, we need to show the government how much we do care about our natural environment. After all, it is not just our future we are protecting, nature should be there for many generations to come to enjoy.

Did you know the environment is the number one concern for young women? (GirlGuiding Attitudes Survey) Well, we took the Guides down to the river to run a few tests of our own! The girls ran flow and clarity tests, as well as learning about the geography and history of the Meon, as part of the Chalk Stream Challenge. Oh! and we caught some Lampreys!





If you want to help to protect the Meon and our other chalk streams there a few things you can do to help. Organisations like Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust are lobbing for amendments to the Planning & Infrastructure Bill, but they need support from the public to get MPs on their side. Our new MP Danny Chambers tells us that he cares about the environment and chalk streams like the River Meon, so why not get in contact to let him know that this is important. On a more practical note if you want to get involved, you can join SoberNewts our local conservation group, or you help with monitoring the river by taking part in The Rivers Trust's 'Big River Watch' in September (see page 7 for contact details).

Local History ... Lest we Forget

The back page of the last issue showed a copy of the prisoner of war release papers of Alfred Earwaker of Soberton. Earwaker, various spellings, is a name which has echoed around the Meon Valley area for many generations. Alfred Reginald Earwaker spent most of his life in the Soberton area, son of Thomas and Alice, he was born at Midlington, in 1912 and after leaving school worked as a gardener.

Nip, as he was widely known, was already serving as a driver with the rank of Corporal in the RASC stationed at Aldershot when he married Winnie Burch grand daughter of Robert White of Chapel Road in the spring of 1939. Winnie had been born and brought up in the Paddington area of London but by time of the 1939 National Registration, when everyone had to obtain a National Registration Number, she and her widowed mother Florence were living in Chapel Road with grandfather White. Nip's release papers give his address as Rose Cottage, Chapel Road.

We understand that soon after the outbreak of WWII Nip was sent to the Pacific arena and was promoted to Sergeant. In 1942 he was captured by the Japanese in Java. He ended up in Sarawak building roads and airfields for the Japanese. During the 3 1/2 vears spent as a Prisoner of War in Borneo his health badly deteriorated and as a result of his treatment he went blind in later years. He received an award in 1953 when he was living in Big Tree Cottages. Later he and Winnie moved to a new bungalow between the recreation ground and the Bold Forester overlooking his beloved Meon Valley and a very short walk to support the Soberton United Football Teams. As his health deteriorated they moved into the village and then as the shops closed and other services came to an end, they moved to Bishops Waltham.

From a newspaper obituary notice of 1990: Peter Carpenter, the widower, then living in Bishops Waltham, was said to be 'from Soberton'. Unfortunately, we cannot trace a Peter although there have been several families with that surname in the parish. The article says that Peter was stationed in Singapore when the Japanese invaded and just escaped by air with just the clothes he stood up in. As a flight engineer he took part in the fight back from Ceylon, Bombay and through the Burma Campaign to recapture S.E. Asia, finally bringing out the 'Death Railway' surviving prisoners of war from Bangkok.

Gordon Harbord of Rudley Holme, Bunns Lane it is understood, received the Burma Star so he too must have served in that area. Gordon was a driver with the Royal Signals and was not discharged until January 1947

Several local lads posted to North Africa were taken prisoner including Richard Norman Crook, known by all as Dick. He was the son of Walter Crook who was Sexton of Holy Trinity Newtown for many years. Two of Walter's sons, Alf and Len, we are told, fought in the First World War and Dick joined the army when the Second World War broke out. He became a Lance Corporal in the Grenadier Guards and was in North Africa fighting against Rommel's African Corps. He was captured at the Battle of the Mareth Line in March 1943 which some regard as the Eighth's Amy's greatest victory. The release papers record that he was uninjured and apparently he was marched up through Italy towards Germany. His first PoW camp to be mentioned was at Latria in Italy where he was forced to work in a cement factory. He was then moved to Museberg and from there to Malberg in Germany, followed by six months in Poland before returning to Germany in August 1944 where he remained until April 6th 1945. Dick returned to Newtown and gave much of his time to the church and community.

George Ernest Sutherland married Soberton girl May Elsie Matthews in 1935 and became a shopkeeper at 1 Linden Villas in the High Street. At the time of his marriage he was said to be an electric light inspector but there was not much call for one of those in the Meon Valley at that time. During WWII George served with the 4th Queens Own Hussars RAC 2nd Armoured Division. Corporal 543767 G E Sutherland was captured in Greece on the 2nd October 1941. After a short time he was moved from Greece to camps in Italy, (Barrie, Capua and Chiavari) and then in September 1943 to Lansdurf in Germany and finally to Hammelburg. On his release signed 4th May 1945 he gave his address as The Cabin, Soberton, We have been told that when he was missing and presumed dead his wife received a small pension for herself and children but the knowledge that he was alive caused her much anxiety over the money she had received and obviously spent. George died at Maybush Lodge, Soberton High Street in 1981.

John Deadman born in 1918 was christened Leslie Samuel, the son of Samuel and Miriam. East Meon born Sam was living in Miriam's village of Soberton by the 1921 census and working as a carter and ploughman for Mr. Bower at Manor Farm. They were living in West Street with their two small sons Aleck and Leslie who both attended Soberton School. We understand that Leslie, better known as John, joined the Army Medical Corps and was part of the British Expeditionary Force. He was captured in Belgium and spent 3 ½ years as a prisoner of war in Poland. He must have been exchanged or released because it is said that it was whilst he was waiting at Gosport for D-Day that he met his future wife Dorothy. Four days after D-Day he went to collect wounded Canadian soldiers from Juno Beach. Later he and Dorothy lived at Curry Cottage on School Hill.

Much of this information is unconfirmed so if you could confirm or add to it the Local History Society would like to hear from you. It is hoped that a list of people who left the village to fight and came home could be remembered alongside those who gave their life. A.P.

The Rebirth of Borderlands Bakehouse



Last month saw the welcome return of our very own local bakery – Borderlands Bakehouse. Dormant in the post Covid years, chief baker and bottlewasher, Jeremy Miles has been joined by his daughter and business partner Jo, who shares his passion for crafting the best possible artisan breads and more naughty bakes.



I sat down with Jeremy after a long hot shift in the Bakehouse to find out more about his return to the ovens.

What prompted you to start up Borderlands Bakehouse again?

When I first started the enterprise in 2019 it was only meant to be a way of providing a bit of comfort food for friends and family during lockdown. My daughter, Jo, was furloughed at home with me and it became a bit of

a passion project for both of us. We never expected it to become so popular but, as restrictions eased and both our 'day jobs' resumed we realised we couldn't sustain the time commitment long term.

The passion didn't die, and we both decided to treat ourselves to an advanced bread making course in London. It was whilst at the Dusty Knuckle that the seeds of the idea to set up business together were first planted. As I officially became an old age pensioner in April, and Jo managed to squeeze her working week into 4 days, there was a realistic possibility of getting something off the ground.



So, what has changed since first time round?

Well, the main thing has been a change of premises. During Covid, I was baking out of our scullery using the family oven – which was never a long term, solution. I had worked out how we could convert our garage into a functioning bakery without too much change to the overall fabric of the building. So, for the first three months after having taken the plunge, we cleared the garage, lined the walls, laid a floor and went on the hunt for equipment. A lot came from other bakeries that were either expanding or, sadly, closing down.

We opened the oven and garage doors for business at the start of June and hit out first milestone last week of successfully passing our Food Hygiene Inspection with a 5 star rating.

And what can we expect in the coming months?

We're deliberately starting small – we've resurrected and grown our mailing list of direct customers, we've started supplying Wilfred's café in Droxford Church with buns and pastries again, and we've already had a stall at a couple of local markets. The reaction has been incredibly positive, both from customers old and new as well as other community and retail outlets We're still only able to bake on a couple of days a week – Fridays and Saturdays at the moment, so need to mange the expansion carefully. But we've got plenty of ideas, so watch this space!






Golden season

If anyone was lucky enough to visit St Peter's Church, Soberton the day before the fete this year, I am sure they would have been bowled over. Not by a miracle of the spiritual kind but more a miracle of nature. Of course our parish church is always beautiful, and I am always cheered by popping in – not necessarily for a service, even cleaning it puts a spring in the step (potential volunteers take note!) But on that particular June day the church burst with an overwhelming scent. Again, not incense or other associated ecclesiastical aromas, but quite simply the most beautiful scent of local flowers, all British grown and most picked and donated from Soberton gardens. It was as if an orchestra of floral aroma had descended and every stem and petal was jostling for aromatic position.



Bucket after bucket packed haphazardly with seasonal June flowers and foliage were waiting for their moments of glory. Roses by the armful, stock, delphiniums to name a few.

There was so much colour, vibrancy and beauty and luckily for these flowers, soon to be arranged into exquisite bouquets and posies by the talented Pauline and Sandra.

And the best part of it all was, not a single flower had been imported and no oasis (which is basically plastic) had been used in the arrangements. Instead, chicken wire was used for the pedestal arrangements and made for a wonderfully natural looking way of displaying cut flowers – it was as if they had just grown out of a hedge – albeit in a beautifully arranged shape!

The next day the fete stall sold donated home-made posies from local gardens as well as Sandra and Pauline's larger bouquets. They did brisk business. I was helping out on the stall and barely minutes went by without fete goers wandering up, smiling and, even if they didn't fancy buying the flowers or entering the raffle, just enjoyed the happiness that flowers can bring. The money raised will be used for the Soberton Church flower fund.

So that was June, and now we are tilting towards autumn. Days are shorter, the light different and certainly all high summer flowers are generally well and truly over. This, however, does not mean the end of enjoying locally foraged and grown flowers and foliage. Sandra has a few brilliant suggestions which follow.

- 1 There are no real floristry rules if you have beautiful flowers you have a beautiful arrangement.
- 2 Seasonal flowers always suit the light of the season. The bright acid yellows of spring just don't seem appropriate in late summer and early autumn longer, richer and softer light.
- 3 We don't need to feel gloomy about autumn flowers, this palette is particularly lovely look at rosehips and old man's beard which are obviously not flowers but add texture, atmosphere and beauty to any arrangement. As the light dies down, muted colours look prettier.
- 4 Sandra's star flower is the hydrangea. "I really like hydrangeas and particularly when they start to fade they can then be used through the winter in dry arrangements always give them water they are self drying if you deprive them of water in the hope you are drying them yourself, they will droop. Give them time to develop.
- 5 Colours this season are the contrasts on the colour spectrum. Blue mixed with orange works especially well. September daisies, dahlias and foliage in autumnal hues are a great combination.
- 6 Most foliage is changing at this time of year, oak leaves look great and should be turning nicely. Another hedgerow favourite of Sandra's is spindle berry: the ointment pink berries on the spikey hedgerow staple. Its pinky berries look especially nice with to golden leaves she says.
- 7 Consider wooded stems. One of Sandra's autumn favourites is unripe blackberries on their bramble stems and rosehips. Another she likes is firey scarlet crowcosmia. It often grows wild. Buddlia which can be found down the popular Soberton walking and riding route, the old railway line, is a good purple to mix with the oranges and golds.

Sandra is keen to use alternatives to oasis. "Generally the church is moving away from unsustainable flower arranging and in fact the RHS have banned oasis. I have always been an organic gardener and when I researched that oasis forms micro plastics, I was keen to find alternatives that still look beautiful. I have an old book on Constant Spry and she used chicken wire and pins – so turning the clock back can often be far more sustainable. Years ago moss was a good water source. You can also use potatoes or cucumber to provide water for a short time.

So final tips on how to get the best from your flowers or foliage, once cut? According to Sandra the rules are simple.

1 Remove all foliage from stems that falls below the water line of the container. That is where the bacteria comes from, perhaps use a bit of flower food but often a tiny unrinsed residue of bleach is enough to keep it at bay. The bleach holds the bacteria back and it is bacteria that makes water smelly and murky and most critically, prevents water uptake.

2 Ensure a clean cut on the stem ends.

3 Give the cut flowers a long cold water soak for a few hours or even overnight in a cool place before you want to arrange them.

So happy flower and foliage foraging – and look out for Sandra and Pauline's plans for 2025. Thoughts on a flower festival in Soberton Church are already afoot. Watch this space for updates!

education, enrichment and ultimately enjoyment hasn't waned. I'm always striving to add meaningful value to my three Es and this summer/autumn term will be no different. This is because we are moving to a new school status and becoming an Academy School. We will be joining Winchester University Academy Trust (UWinAT).



Moving to an ambitious, growing academy is very exciting. The prospect of greater collaborative and supportive practice for all staff including myself will enhance everyone's professional development. Road Report

Edited by Jonty Sherwill this feature aims to raise awareness about what we can each do to encourage more considerate driving with benefits for all road users whether on foot, horseback, cycle or behind the wheel or reins. The views expressed are personal and based on 50 years of driving. Friendly feedback is always welcome.

If you ruled the roads!

If you were given the job of Secretary of State for Transport, if only for a day, what would you change? Scrap smart motorways, make black boxes and dash cams compulsory in all cars, or maybe introduce mandatory re-testing of all drivers every five years?! The options are many and varied but getting cabinet colleagues to agree would be the toughest bit, re-election of a government is far more important!

What surprises me is that with the increasing density of traffic and the growing disregard for general road safety my view of personal freedoms that we have all long treasured might be shifting.

Some of us as youngsters may have misbehaved to varying degrees but in those days before speed cameras the risk of getting pulled over by traffic police was real. They took a dim view of faulty lights or worn tyres but often as not it was a stern talking to they handed out, not a ticket, and that approach earned them the respect they needed to do their job.

But the world has changed, cars have got safer and bigger but also more powerful, and with fewer police patrols the business of keeping safe now relies on self-policing. If everyone would play their part we might begin to see a drop in the accident figures.

Points North

Vicki and I drove to Warwickshire a couple of weekends ago to watch her 4-year-old granddaughter at a Pony Club camp with around 80 other youngsters, each dedicated to the care of their prize pony, and with great camaraderie evident amongst the kids and parents.

Unsurprisingly there was a magnificent fleet of horseboxes, horse trailers, Range Rovers and other 4x4s, but I didn't spot many electric vehicles to boost the green credentials. Only time will tell if battery power can ever be a viable solution for towing vehicles, or will hydrogen power become the green solution.


En route up there on one of the hottest days of the year I rued my decision not to recharge the air conditioning, but nonetheless with windows down it was an enjoyable drive. Something notable was the number of broken downs cars. Is that because of lack of

servicing or just basic pre-trip checks, so easily forgotten nowadays with warning lights for everything.

Smoother motoring

While driving around in Warwickshire and also into Northamptonshire things felt a bit different to back home in the Meon Valley. Noticeable was the lower density of traffic, the generally better condition of the roads, the use of speed cameras to enforce 50mph roads in rural areas, and the excellent location signage including village gateways. The overall impression was of a more cohesive strategy for speed enforcement and driver information. Although we all share the same Highway Code different areas in the UK seem to approach road management quite a bit differently.

Local priorities and budget allocation may be part of it, or just determination to maintain high standards. Either way I'm still wondering what happened to our share of the £1.6 billion in funding to start to 'reverse a decade of decline on our roads'. The potholes and lumps and bumps on Heath Road were marked up weeks ago but soon got washed away. Traffic control lights arrived but a day later were removed with no work seemingly done. Hopefully by the time you read this it will all be sorted, but also rather frustrating is that the village gateway proposals recently submitted by the parish council are delayed because of lack of

DNIPRO CITY HOSPITAL BURNS CENTRE INTENSIVE CARE UNIT



URGENT HELP NEEDED

Updated 14.7.25

This appeal has been set up by SNUG to provide an urgent, focussed support to Dnipro City Hospital, a regional medical centre that plays a crucial role in treating injured soldiers from the ongoing conflict in Donbas. Since the start of the full-scale war in 2022, the hospital has seen a dramatic increase in the number of casualties requiring specialised care, surgery, and rehabilitation of their cardiovascular system. The Burns Centre is where reconstructive surgeries are performed and where they are in desperate need of many medical supplies, including specialised skin grafting equipment, atraumatic wound dressings, hydrogel burn dressings, pain relief and even basic items such as sterile wipes.

With funds raised so far, and with the help of Ukraine Relief, we have been able to purchase 2 electrodermatomes and 5 additional attachments. The surgeons at the unit, on behalf of the entire department, sincerely thank you and SNUG for this enormous help. They never dreamed they would receive such assistance, and so quickly, and already it is making a great difference.

The next item urgently needed is at least one pair of specialist surgical loupes (glasses), which allow surgeons to carry out detailed reconstructive surgery.

Right now, they are quite literally 'working blind', leaving patients vulnerable to slower recovery and reduced quality of life. Without £3,500 to fund this essential support, nothing will improve.

Freely allowing the flexible use of the recreation ground changing rooms for temporary storage has provided SNUG with invaluable space to receive, sort and distribute donations from our local area.


SNUG Appeal - Dnipro Burns Centre

Although the war in Ukraine began in 2014, with major escalation in 2022, the suffering continues over a decade later, and the need for help is as great as ever. If anything, the situation is even graver now as the intensity of attacks continues to increase.

As you may be aware, SNUG is currently supporting the Dnipro Burns Centre. It is shocking how little of the basic materials the Burns Centre has to carry out vital medical care, let alone the specialist equipment to properly help their severely injured casualties. The human suffering is immense – not just for the casualties, but also for all the medical

teams who are trying to help severely injured people with inadequate resources.

As promised, the chart shows the donations to date (13/7/25). Two electrodermatomes and blades have already been purchased. We are now aiming to help further by purchasing a specialist pair of surgical loupes (glasses), which allow surgeons to conduct detailed reconstructive surgery. They have nothing like this now, and are literally 'working blind', which reduces recovery and quality of life for patients. At a cost of £3,500 a pair, and without extra support, this situation will not change.



What Next for SNUG?

Going forward, all donated items of clothing, medical, health and food items will continue to be swiftly allocated, or delivered to Ukraine Relief. This will be done on a weekly basis by Sam Dunlop, who is also supporting Ukraine Relief with other tasks and projects. If you have any household items or furniture to donate, please contact Sam in advance to check suitability and discuss arrangements. Cash donations for SNUG or SNUG Project Appeals would also be greatly appreciated, as these can rapidly buy specialist equipment and supplies.

Our 'Bags of Love for Christmas' project is in the planning stage – more information to follow soon.

In your garden ... make compost and eat your garden

I've made it abundantly clear over previous articles of the importance of mulching. I currently buy a lot of my mulch in from a local producer, but I've been forced to go one step further. A good customer of mine has had a monolithic, three bay compost extravaganza built at the bottom of their garden. Each bay is large enough to fit my ample van in with ease.



I have had to dig deep into my knowledge banks and even started researching about the finer art of composting and not just about 'green' and 'browns' or the lasagna layering of materials that we are all familiar with but also maximum/minimum temperatures (I now own a compost thermometer!) volume, moisture ...the list goes on.

I turned to Charles Dowding and his new(ish) book, simply called, Compost. It explains it in very simplistic terms but also delves deep into the science of it all. As expected, there is a breaking point where the mass of the material collapses in on itself, removing space for oxygen and creating an anaerobic compost – smells and is wet/slimy. Turning the compost and adding brown material like woodchip will create those small spaces for oxygen to create a digester compost and the compost will return to fine health.

If you have a vegetable patch in your garden, you will be starting to reap the rewards of all your hard work with juicy raspberries and crunchy lettuce leaves which have all been spotted by and tested – for quality control purposes only of course.

Fear not, if you do not have access to a vegetable garden then your actual garden is full of edible delights. I'm not talking about raiding the bird table or turning your hand to insect BBQ, but the flowers themselves can be quite the delicacy:

Roses: with their delicate fragrance, roses can be used to refine desserts, jams, jellies and cocktails and make crystallised decorations.

Lavender: try lavender sugar to liven up biscuits and preserves or add the blooms to stock when making sauce for duck, lamb and chicken.

Carnations: carnations are ideal for injecting colour into salads and soups but tear the petals off rather than use the whole flower as the base is bitter. Taste-wise, expect something spicy!

Daisies: the buds make an excellent substitute for capers once preserved in vinegar.

Camomile: these flowers have a homely apple-like flavour. Mix them into fruity bakes or sprinkle them over fresh salads.

Once you have indulged in the bounty of food that your garden has provided, remember to repay it by continuing to dead head those roses to further extend their season and start to make notes of what did and didn't work this summer. Were there spaces that could be filled with a little pre-planning now?

And finally, pour a glass of something cold, find a shady spot and enjoy the beauty of your own garden.

Governmental Changes to Local Government

During the next few years Central Government is instigating a series of changes to the way County and District Councils will operate. As yet we do not believe this will affect Parish Councils.

There will be two key changes in relation to these proposals. First, there will be a directly elected Mayor for Hampshire and the Isle of Wight. Second, a series of boundary changes are to be considered in order to establish about five or six unitary authorities across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight. Consultations on this process are being undertaken by Hampshire County Council (HCC) and Winchester City Council (WCC). More detailed information can be found on the websites for HCC and WCC, see below. In outline it is likely that the Mayoral elections will take place on May 2026 with the changes being implemented in 2027. We still expect to have Parish Councillor elections in May 2026 as noted in this column in the June/July magazine. Our Clerk is happy to assist in directing residents in finding out more about the consultations outlined.

Soberton Recreation Ground

The Parish Council is committed to football returning to the recreation ground and work to reinstate the football pitch is underway. We will provide updates on progress through the parish website on a regular basis. In addition to the pitch itself, work will be carried out to open and clear ditches, and clear scrub and trees to assist in general drainage of the overall open space. Some repair work is being carried out on the children's play area as directed through a recent inspection of the facilities. However, this will have a limited life and consideration is being given to its total replacement in the next few years, including its location and equipment for the range of age groups.

Hedges and Ditches

Every year the Parish Council reminds land owners of their responsibilities regarding hedges and ditches. It has been fairly dry through the spring and summer, this makes clearing ditches simpler.

We urge everyone with watercourses crossing their land to act now. It will rain this winter and recent evidence across the globe is telling us that storms may become more intense in the future. Hedges, particularly those which line our beautiful lanes throughout the parish, do require pruning. Visibility of riders, pedestrians and cyclists is vitally important to their safety. We are a rural parish without pavements therefore whatever mode of transport you choose you will share the lane with others. Let's make our Parish safer.

The Parish Design Statement (PDS)

A final draft of the PDS was approved at the council meeting in June and it has now been submitted to the two planning authorities which cover our parish, namely South Downs National Park (SDNP) and Winchester City Council (WCC). We are seeking their comments before commencing a consultation process with the local community and subsequently obtaining formal approval from the authorities.

Planning

There have not been many new planning applications over the past few months. However, we are aware of an increasing number of planning breaches and the PC is in constant contact with the enforcement team based at WCC, both reporting breaches and seeking updates on ensuing actions. We would highlight that these can be complex legal cases which means that they can take a long time to resolve and it is not always possible for information to be made public. Notwithstanding these issues resolving planning breaches, we would urge residents to report any breaches they are aware of directly to WCC (www.winchester.gov.uk/planning/planning-enforcement/report-a-suspected-breach-of-planning-control).

Where is the 'Small is Beautiful' and 'Environmental Impact Analysis'?

The biggest shake-up of English local government in 50 years is gathering pace, including plans to reorganise councils in Hampshire and the Solent by 2028.

Hampshire currently has three unitary authorities, Hampshire County Council, and 11 district councils. The Government wants fewer, larger councils for greater "efficiency." Councils must agree new boundaries by 26 September 2025. Multiple proposals can be submitted if they cover the whole area. This reorganisation will reshape local services and communities for decades — Winchester, for example, will be merged into a much larger unitary council.

Hampshire County Council is expected to have chosen its preferred unitary authorities option at a July Cabinet meeting which is likely to include two vast councils with a population of over 655,000 each. For more details on the options see Hampshire County Council website. The public will have until the 17 August 2025 to make comment - engagement details to be announced.

Residents in 11 district and borough councils (which includes Winchester), including Southampton, Portsmouth and the Isle of Wight, will have had an opportunity to inform the choice of three alternative options in July. Both approaches claim to aim for efficient and future-proofed services. These options are likely to be smaller in size to the County proposal.

Both processes overlook two vital questions: *Is small still beautiful?* and *Will there be an environmental impact assessment?* The Government's reorganisation criteria and principles don't allow for these tests.

Many warn this shake-up must not sacrifice what local councils do best: democracy, community cohesion, economic development and care for the environment. The Economist E.F. Schumacher's *Small is Beautiful* reminds us that smaller, rooted councils are more responsive and trusted, while bigger units risk detachment and loss of local identity.

Efficiency matters — but not at the cost of democracy and resilience. A robust climate and nature assessment must underpin any new council map. Worryingly, no comprehensive carbon, biodiversity or sustainability checks in England have been done for recent reorganisations. If left until after decisions are made, harm will be built in and costly to fix.

Some argue larger councils could create a Simpler, Stronger, Secure model of public service delivery. This means making services easier to find and use; better integrating services across the tiers of Local Government and with Partner organisations and better decision making. Even so, *Small is Beautiful* must be more than a slogan — community and environmental integrity must not be traded away in the quest for process and financial improvements.

It's also concerning that data behind the preferred options for both reorganisation scoping work hasn't been fully shared — only partial information has been released. Talking about future 'Neighbourhood Empowerment' without clear evidence is unhelpful for genuine public engagement.

Your Councillors will keep making the case for full transparency and balanced outcomes before any final decision is made.

Fast-Track Employment Training

The highly successful Hampshire Skills Bootcamps programme is set to run again for a third year, thanks to funding of £7 million secured by Hampshire County Council from the Department for Education (DfE) – almost double that of the previous year.



This funded, fast-track training benefits Hampshire's residents aged 19 years and over, enabling job seekers, as well as those in work to gain further training, while employers across the county can benefit from upskilling their workforce. Based on local employer demand and the skill-sets currently in short supply, the Bootcamps provide a direct path to employment upon completion, with a guaranteed job interview at the end of each course for those who are unemployed.

Over the last two years, Skills Bootcamps training has given hundreds of working adults confidence in their abilities and helped advance their careers for a more secure future for themselves and their families.



The latest round of funding will enable training to be offered to at least 1,750 learners to study across a variety of subject areas, including AI, leadership and management, teaching assistant, data analytics, and B2B sales. All courses are flexible and include a minimum of 60 hours of learning across a maximum 16-week period.

Residents in Hampshire can benefit from this learning and development training offer by simply signing up for a course and completing at least 60 hours of learning over a period of up to 16 weeks. The courses are flexible with learning planned to fit around professional and family commitments allowing people in different circumstances to gain the skills employers are looking for.

For most Skills Bootcamp courses, no previous knowledge in the subject is needed. Courses can be classroom-based, on-the-job or online and unemployed participants are guaranteed a job interview at the end of their course.

In 2024/25, the County Council enrolled over 1,000 learners onto the Bootcamps in project management, digital marketing, data analytics, coding, construction, early years, health and social care, hospitality, film and TV, engineering, and green skills – such as installing residential heat pumps, and electric vehicle repair and maintenance.

Help Nature Recover across Hampshire

The public have recently been asked for their views on the Draft Local Nature Recovery Strategy for Hampshire which sets out a series of biodiversity priorities to help reverse nature's decline. Produced in conjunction with a wide range of organisation, the draft strategy maps the most valuable existing habitat for nature, setting out proposals for creating, restoring and enhancing habitats, and suggests priorities and targets for nature's recovery. Among a broad range of suggested priorities and actions, the draft strategy includes proposals that could:

- shape how future funding for farming and land management is used
- ♣help local planning authorities to understand locations important for conserving and restoring biodiversity
- ♣identify the highest priority areas for habitat creation and connectivity
- *provide guidance on actions on farmland and woodland to achieve nature recovery and move towards more sustainable farming practices
- ♣help guide local communities with funding applications for nature recovery projects
- *suggest potential measures for embedding nature into urban infrastructure, such as stormwater management

In 2021, the Environment Act required local areas to produce Local Nature Recovery Strategies. The Government designated Hampshire County Council as the Responsible Authority for delivering the strategy for the whole of Hampshire, including the areas covered by Southampton and Portsmouth City Councils, as well as the New Forest and South Downs National Parks (that are within Hampshire). The final version of the Local Nature Recovery Strategy for Hampshire is expected to be published by the end of this year.



Ageing Well

While living longer is something to be celebrated and our ageing population presents opportunities, it also has implications for the economy, services and society. Knowing the size and structure of the population is fundamental for decision makers and policy makers in the UK. The latest census data confirm that the Hampshire population continues to age. There are over 300,000 people living in Hampshire who are aged 65 years and over, this equates to over one in five of our residents (22%). Hampshire's population is older than

England overall where 19% of the total population are 65 years and over.

Across the geography of Hampshire districts there are distinct differences, the area of Rushmoor has a comparatively young population with 15% aged 65 years and over. The New Forest has the oldest population structure where almost one third of the population (29%) are aged 65 years or more. The number of older people is expected to continue to rise substantially, local forecasts show that the biggest increase will be the in the 75 years and over population which is forecast to increase by 24% by 2028.



Local Government Reform

Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) sees the Government requiring all two-tier council areas in the country being replaced by single-tier unitary authorities which deliver all services in their area. Under the Government's plans, the 15 councils currently covering the Hampshire and the Solent area, would cease to exist by 2028 (Hampshire County Council, 11 district / borough councils, Southampton and Portsmouth unitary councils, and Isle of Wight Council), and instead be replaced by fewer unitary councils.

The County Council are working on plans to ensure that any new councils created in Hampshire and the Solent prioritise the best interests of residents and a financially strong future by taking into account the large-scale services the County Council delivers. HCC provide by value the vast majority of council services people receive across Hampshire and the Solent which support people at every stage of life. They are vital to those people who need them most, so the Council want to ensure they remain high quality, resilient, and financially sustainable through strong unitary councils that can meet future challenges.

Since submitting initial proposals to Government this Spring HCC, jointly with local authority partners, have been carefully studying all the data and evidence, weighing up the pros and cons of various potential options, and gathering early views from residents and from the people who help keep public services moving – like the Police, Fire Service, NHS, headteachers of our schools, and others across local government, as well as our own Authority, to gain real-world feedback on what LGR needs to deliver. This has helped to inform our shortlist of four options which HCC are now assessing.

The four options are listed below:

Option '

- North: Basingstoke and Deane, East Hampshire, Hart, New Forest, Rushmoor, Test Valley, Winchester
- South: Eastleigh, Fareham, Gosport, Havant, Portsmouth, Southampton
- Isle of Wight

Option 2

- North: Basingstoke and Deane, East Hampshire, Hart, Rushmoor, Test Valley, Winchester
- South-West: Eastleigh, New Forest, Southampton
- South-East: Fareham, Gosport, Havant, Portsmouth
- Isle of Wight

Option 3

- North: Basingstoke and Deane, East Hampshire, Hart, Rushmoor, Winchester
- South-West: Eastleigh, New Forest, Southampton, Test Valley
- South-East: Fareham, Gosport, Havant, Portsmouth
- Isle of Wight

Option 4

- North-East: Basingstoke and Deane, Hart, Rushmoor
- Central: Test Valley, Winchester, East Hampshire
- South-West: Eastleigh, New Forest, Southampton
- South-East: Fareham, Gosport, Havant, Portsmouth
- Isle of Wight

HCC are now in a position to dig into the detail of four options and consider which best meets central Government criteria. Once this next stage of robust analysis has been completed, we will propose a preferred option from these

four, which will be considered by councillors. If this single option is then agreed by the County Council and Cabinet, the County Council will ask for feedback on it from residents and stakeholders later this summer. Your views will help HCC shape our final design for the future of Hampshire and Solent area councils, which will be submitted to Government this autumn, alongside other options presented by our partners. Government will consider all the proposals and carry out a formal public consultation on their agreed option for our area next year.









More Special Needs School Places

More children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) in Gosport and the New Forest will access the right support closer to home, thanks to the addition of new special needs places in two local schools.

- A new Resourced Provision at Newtown Church of England Voluntary Controlled Primary School, Gosport for 10 pupils aged four to 11 with Autism Spectrum Condition, to open in phases from September 2025. A Resourced Provision is a specialist environment for children with SEND within a mainstream school.
- The expansion of an existing Resourced Provision at Ashley Infant School, New Milton by eight places, providing 15 places in total for pupils with Autism Spectrum Condition and 17 places for pupils with Speech, Language and Communication needs, from September 2025 for children aged four to seven.

This follows two formal statutory consultations which were carried out on the proposals earlier this year.

- "a fantastic form of mindfulness in which players shut out their concerns, stop thinking about life and its issues and stresses and just concentrate on what they are doing"
- a great form of exercise with 1 hour of table tennis using up 300+ calories
- · one that involves no physical contact and no high impact movement which can damage joints
- noted for its emphasis on movement, stretching, hand-eye co-ordination and quick reflexes
- one that "exerts a greater influence on cognitive function than any other sport"
- one that exercises every area of the brain, including the *prefrontal cortex*, which develops focus and concentration and the *basal ganglia* which control our ability to remain calm and process our emotions

And, of course it's fun! Little wonder then that table tennis is one of the most popular of the activities offered by MVARA to its members, with over 30 individuals signed up to play in its weekly sessions, enjoying the sport, the exercise and the opportunity to socialise.



But there is more. Most MVARA players are either returners to something they played at school – some over 50 years ago – or completely new to the sport, and have gone on to join locals table tennis clubs and play in local leagues.

Although investigations into air accidents tend to dominate the media, marine accidents are far more common. Shipping disasters have occurred throughout history, but it was not until after the inquiry into the tragic loss of 193 lives in the Herald of Free Enterprise that capsized at Zeebrugge on 6 March 1987 that the MAIB

was formed. The MAIB is a UK government organisation authorised to investigate all maritime accidents in UK waters and those involving UK registered ships worldwide. Investigations are limited to establishing cause,

promoting awareness of risks and preventing recurrence. It may also participate in other maritime investigations where British subjects are involved or where the UK has a substantial interest. Investigations have included recent high-profile cases such as the collision between *MV Solong* and *MV Stena Immaculate* off the Humber Estuary on 10 March 2025 and the tragic loss of the 56m British

Registered yacht *Bayesian* off Sicily on 19 August 2024. Prior to formation of MAIB, *ad hoc* inquiries were held under the auspices of the Department of Transport in its various former incarnations.

Bill Evans left school at 16 and joined the Merchant Navy as a deck officer, spending the next 8 years working worldwide in ferries and dry cargo vessels. In the 1980s, he joined the Royal Navy and, during 30 years' service, served in every type of warship, from patrol boats to aircraft carriers. His last assignment before taking up his current role was to oversee the safe operation of five military ports, three in the UK and two overseas. It was while undertaking this role that he successfully applied for the job of MAIB Inspector, starting in 2017.

- Friday 15 August: The Reverend Canon Anthony Hulbert will conduct a Commemorative Evensong Service to celebrate the 80th Anniversary of the official ending of the Second World War in the Far East.
- Saturday 16 August: Do you know what life was like for those involved in the 'Forgotten War'? Come into St Mary's and All Saints Church in Droxford anytime between 1030 and 1500 to view and hear the stories and history of those who fought the Campaigns. The displays and recordings will concentrate on the British, former-British Empire and Dominion forces and civilians who took part in the fighting in South-East Asia. Viewed from the personal histories of those who were there you will discover that the conditions during the Far East campaign were very different from those during the war in Europe. Troops on both sides fought across oceans, in monsoon drenched jungles, on snow-covered hills, and in scorching tropical heat on remote islands. The surrender of Malaya and Singapore constituted arguably Britain's worst defeat of the Second World War in 1942, when approximately 9,000 British, pre-partition Indian, and Dominion troops were lost and around 130,000 taken prisoners of war. In 1944, at the battles of Kohima and Imphal, the Fourteenth Army inflicted on the Japanese Army its greatest ever defeat, a battle that was voted by the British public as Britain's greatest ever battle. Despite the magnitude of the war in the Far East, many feel their contribution has been forgotten or overlooked; please drop in and help us to put that right.

Above – Bollens Shop and Bakery at what is now Wick House in Church Rd. Newtown's 1st shop was in business by 1867 & the Post Office included by 1885. It was taken over by Isaac Bollen in 1902 & after Isaac's death in 1915, run by his wife Charlotte and son William until his death in 1942, when it closed. This photo, showing Oak View & Ivy Cottages on the right, is dated approx. 1920's. **Below** – A similar, but earlier view, judging from the clothing, from very early 20thC. Note the ubiquitous bicycle parked outside in both photos!
