Foreword ... from Revd Andy

Complex Ankle Fracture

As some of you will know, I have been off work since July 2024, after sustaining a complex ankle fracture. I was doing some gardening and caught my foot in the "V" of a branch that was laying on the ground, covered by leaves. I tumbled, and my ankle was badly broken. My life was changed in a split second. Two weeks later, the ankle was surgically mended – in a four hour operation - with the help of three pieces of metal and fifteen screws. I just wanted to share three reflections about this whole experience.

Thank God for the NHS.

The National Health Service faces many challenges and difficulties, but we are so lucky to live in a country where we can access health care when we need it. Within an hour of sustaining my injury, I was being attended to by seven or eight health care professionals in Q.A. hospital's A&E, and early that same evening I was in theatre, under the care of another dedicated team (all missing England playing in the Euros final!) having an external frame fitted. After another two weeks in hospital, I was operated on by a highly experienced foot and ankle surgeon, who also happens to be the President of the National Orthopedic Association. What would two weeks in hospital and two complex operations have cost if I had been living in a country without a free health service?

Never take the every day for granted

For ten weeks, I could only move about using one foot, with the help of crutches. I couldn't carry a cup of tea; or have anything approaching a full night's sleep; or get into a bath; or go out for a

walk. Four things that I wouldn't have thought twice about before the accident. Suddenly, they were precious experiences that I longed for with a deep yearning. The saying "count your blessings" took on an deep resonance. We are so very lucky to have what we (ironically) call "every day experiences".

God loves us for who we are, not what we do I have found it so hard to be unable to go about my usual ministry: taking of services, etc. Clearly for some people, my priestly duties are what define me, because the only questions that some people ask are: "when do you think you will be back?" or "can we assume you will be able to do so and so the month after next?" or "any news yet on when you might be back to work?" I have found it impossible to escape the guilt of not being able to do what I normally do, and of others having to cover "my" duties for you. But I am also joyfully aware that the Lord does not love me for my ministry (just as well!) He loves me.....as me. I have had to learn afresh that who I am (as God's creation and his beloved child) is more important than what I do. As one Franciscan writer puts it, "God created us to be human be-ings, not human do-ings". Or as another spiritual writer says, "It is hard for us to grasp this profound truth; we do not have to "do" anything, because God could not possibly love us any more than he does at this precise moment."

John Parker RIP



More than Half a Century of Theatre in Soberton

Amateur Dramatics has been alive and well in our community for more than 56 years and looks set to thrive for many more.

When the current Soberton Players was established in 1985 it built on a great tradition inspired by Captain "Tony" Evans, a former Parish Council chairman, District Councillor and passionate amateur actor.

Determined to provide Soberton with a venue suitable for theatrical performances, Tony Evans led a fund-raising campaign to build Soberton Village Hall, which opened in 1968. Tony's dream of live theatre in Soberton flourished there until the Players disbanded around the time of his death in 1976.

The Thespian spirit was not quite extinguished, however, and in 1984 a group including some of the original

players created a village "Son et Lumiere" historic pageant in St Peter's churchyard in support of the Church Restoration Fund. Bolstered by the success of this event, Soberton Players relaunched the following February with a home-written panto, Cinders & Co.



As funds and confidence grew, the group moved on to professional scripts and a regular programme of comedy, drama and panto which built a solid reputation for quality entertainment. The introduction of bar facilities and the occasional theatre supper also boosted the popularity and profitability of the shows.

By 2006, Soberton Players felt ready to tackle a fullscale musical production – the enormously successful Oliver!, which attracted new talent to the group and pushed its technical boundaries.

The group continues to welcome new members to the team which still includes a handful of players who were in the 1985 production. It is also proud of several former players now making their mark in the professional theatre, including Kate Potter (with the group from 2012 to 2016) who was deputy director of the recent Chichester Festival Theatre production of Cinderella.

Soberton Players achieved a lot in its first 40 years. The next challenge will be keeping Am Dram alive in an increasingly digital age. Judging by the look of wonder on the children's faces during Treasure Island recently the Players might just have cracked it!

A little romance never goes amiss and was delivered by the love-struck couple Paula Hobbs (Jack Hawkins) and Nikki Dry (Jenny Trelawney).

Now every panto needs a Dame and Mike Flanagan was a natural and in the true spirit of panto I thought he 'pulled it off' really well...

The Wenches were great and brought a real lift to the choruses and songs all ably directed by our talented Music Director. Kate Jones.

It was a big cast so I can't mention everyone here individually, but the ladies of the WI Susan Hyland, Sharon Canning, Katie Flanagan and Shirley Tebby were great and bounced off each other really well producing some great performances and very funny moments.



The cannibal children were really good too and very well-rehearsed. It's so nice to see the youngsters doing their bit.

A big well done to all the cast and crew, please forgive me if I haven't mentioned you individually but you were all great. Finally, well done Pete Berkeley for your very competent direction and bringing the whole thing together so entertainingly.

... Soberton Players!

Villager Chris van Schaick reflects on a 15year association with Soberton Players and what that means to him.

Sometimes I've been the leading man, sometimes a bitpart player. Sometimes I've just been the chap in Row 8 at Soberton Village Hall, laughing and cheering and clapping.

But what Soberton Players have given me above all else is a sense of wonder at the way any village am dram group – and ours in particular – helps glue a community together.

We celebrate the bricks and mortar of our cohesion – church, school, pub. Quite rightly. But the am dram

group is a binding agent of special quality.

It's an emotional bank in which everyone invests. The performers are prepared to get up on stage and show a different side. The backstage crew are prepared to put in the unglamorous hours. The drinks volunteers are prepared to pour a lot of wine. The audience members are prepared to turn up.

Everyone invests a bit of themselves for the sake of something bigger. That's my definition of community.

You know it's working when a stranger stops you on a dog walk to talk about your performance.

Together, Soberton and Newton are home to 1600 people. For a community that small to have sustained the Players and their level of ambition and creativity for so long is remarkable. We've ranged from the sublime to the gor blimey. And I should know about the latter, having channelled

Frankie Howerd in *Up Pompeii*. Not to mention Alfie



in One Man, Two Guvnors and Inspector Pratt in Murdered To Death.

But think of our fragmented, atomised world. And wonder that twice yearly, a group of grown-ups spend their Monday and Thursday nights rehearsing to be a bit daft in three evening shows and a matinee. The bigger result? Community togetherness.

In two cases, Dads dropping off their young children for rehearsals got roped into the cast themselves. Two signs of the torch being passed between generations. It gives me hope that years hence, when the Millennials are calling the shots, the Players will still be glueing our community together.

Local History - Treasure from a Tip

Nearly a quarter of a century ago our Local History Society were the recipients of an album containing the artwork of a young lad made in the last decade of the 19th century. We were told that the scrapbook or album had been found by the son of a Basingstoke couple using their local municipal tip. The cover in itself was rather interesting and the boy suggested it was too nice to be left there. Discovering that some of the artwork related to Soberton they brought it to some friends living in School Hill and hoped that they might learn more about the young artist.

Via the parish council the album found its way to the society and it became fairly obvious that the artist, who signed his work "H. Morley" was connected with Soberton's vicar, the Rev. William Hammond Morley. There were paintings of Soberton House and stables where the Rev. Hammond had lived before the Vicarage was built. Another depicted a laden carriage with the title "Our arrival in Soberton" and one or two represented stories in the history of Soberton that he must have heard from his host.

Wilmington also featured in his art work. Through a little detective work we discovered that a curate by the name of Morley had served as curate of Wilmington and that both he and our William Morley were the sons of a vicar of Newport Pagnell. But neither could have been the artists father since we were sure that he referred to the Wilmington curate as Uncle Ned and Soberton's Rev. Morley had only had two daughters, Mary (Molly) and Violet.

The majority of the work was dated 1891 or 1892 and seemed to have connections with St Paul's School and featured school plays. Pauline Betts noted that the 'classical plays' were the type that would have been performed by the St. Paul's School then at Hammersmith. A relative of Pauline had held a post at the school and she may have seen similar productions a few decades later.

The committee felt we must inform Wilmington and St. Paul's School and as archivist I wrote to both. After a considerable time, Wilmington replied but were not interested. A fire, an arson attack, had seriously affected the church and the letter implied they had no time to check records and most had been destroyed.

The letter sent to St Paul's School asked if they had any record of a pupil called H. Morley born circa 1877/8. It also contained a photocopy of one of the paintings of a drama production. They were definitely interested but unfortunately could not establish a link and suggested contacting other St Paul's Schools. We found there had at some time been one in Southsea and that seemed a possibility. We now felt we were justified in keeping the album in Soberton.

However, a year or two ago in a talk on smuggling I used the picture of the Soberton House stables, as reputedly, the curate, who lived in Soberton House, could not understand why his horse was totally exhausted some mornings!! The resident of the house now converted from the stables was interested and asked to see the album. The problem was six years ago the archives had to be divided between several committee members. It was eventually re-located and further research was undertaken.

The starting point was the Vicar of Newport Pagnell and his family of nine. There were three further sons, one of them being John Lacy Collison Morley. The 1881 census shows John, a doctor, living in Edith Road, Fulham with his wife, daughter and a three-year old son, Harold Duke Collison Morley.

Subsequently we found that Harold had studied at the Slade School of Art, become a professional soldier and had died at the Battle of Loos in 1915. Lieut. Col. H.D. Collison Morley of the East Kent Regiment is buried in Dud Corner Cemetery, Dept. du Passe de Calais. He left a wife and at least one child. Kathleen Collison Morley. Further research by another member of the society showed that Kathleen, later Mrs. Kathleen Wood, had become a writer of children's books and she had died in Basingstoke in September 1991. Someone clearing the house had possibly not recognized the value of her father Harold's work and the album had found its way to the tip. There was also the suggestion that Dr. John Morley had been the medical practitioner used by St. Paul's School which, as he lived in nearby Edith Road, was very likely.

Rev. George Morley of Newport Pagnell and his wife had nine children, five sons and four daughters. The eldest son, George Lyddon had a career in the army and rose to the rank of Lieut. Col. His Irish wife Mabel Ingram nee Wheeler is, in the 1891 census, an authoress although no published evidence has so far been found.

The second son, John Lacey Collison went into Medicine and was the father of Harold, the artist and grandfather of Kathleen, author of children's books. However his eldest son, Lacey Collison was also the author of "Companion into Hampshire", "Shakespeare in Italy" and "Les Borgia"

Third and fourth sons, Edward and William, entered the church and the fifth son was a land agent. Perhaps Soberton's Rev William considered writing a history of Soberton, his note books show he collected a lot of material.

Ordinary miracles

Snowdrops, soil and music Can spring be far behind?

Probably by the time this piece has made its way into the Parish Magazine the very first sights of spring will be in evidence. We had an unexpected rush of *Primulas* in December who met a frozen assassination in the recent very cold snap. And yet. Already the soil, if we could hear its heartbeat, is beginning to move from hard as iron slumber state to a lively universe for future glories. The evidence of this, of course, is the earliest spring flowers and that always, for me at least, means snowdrops. They are such a curious reminder of unlikely vitality. As a child I learned a poem called Snowdrops by Mary Vivian and I think of it every spring.

I like to think
That, long ago,
There fell to earth
Some flakes of snow
Which loved this cold,
Grey world of ours
So much, they stayed
As snowdrop flowers.



There is no doubt that snowdrops are one of the wonders of winter. When I was researching my last book, *Eden's Keepers*, I came upon an extraordinarily apposite and, typically of the speaker, perceptive bit of advice. Bear in mind a ninety year old woman, Nancy Tennant, spoke these words in 1987, way before the internet was a part of our everyday lives, let alone digital phones and AI, she delivered this advice to her numerous great nieces and nephews.

"You are growing up in a push-button world, a lot of your thinking will be done for you. Don't let this dull your sense of wonder. Think about the swallow who goes off to Africa for the winter and then comes back to its old nest...think about the snowdrop, when the first frost comes, you can try as hard as you like to get your fork into the ground, you won't succeed but up it comes all wibbly-wobbly with apparently no trouble at all. These are the things that matter."

Soil health, sustainable farming, regeneration and general interest in earth is a big subject now and this year and if you are pondering on having an outing that is a bit out of the ordinary, the exhibition, SOIL A World At Our Feet at Somerset House, London might appeal.

Artworks, artefacts as well as extraordinary facts about the most basic of earthly delights will elevate what most people disregard as ordinary into the not only extraordinary but almost magical. Of course, there is a serious side to the exhibition, it is about the health of the ground that sustains us all. The website blurb reads as follows...

"Soil is more than dirt. Soil is a secret world at our feet, an ecosystem as diverse in life as our night sky is full of stars. The billions of bacteria contained in its rhizospheres do for plants what the microbes in our stomachs do for us: sustain life. Our relationship with soil is our connection to Earth itself. Without soil, there is no us."

Of course, in the last few years, there has been a slew of books offering writing not only on facts associated with soil, but people's feelings associated with it. *Underland* by Robert McFarlane was the first that captured my interest – now there seem to be scores of them but the message is essentially the same. Good, clean muck needs care to remain good and there is a lot more going on in it that we may have thought. Closer to home, the brilliant Hampshire Gardens Trust, of which I am a happy member, are not only holding even more wonderful open gardens this year – (look at their website for details) but also, for anyone wanting to hear expert advice and opinion, they have study days. Their next is on the 19th of March at St Peter's Church, Ropley. This year the theme is the rather chilling *'Our native tree, survive, migrate or die.*" This will be a must for anyone interested in which trees to plant, what to look upon with confidence and others that might be more susceptible to disease.

But back to snowdrops and to conclude. Today, when I drove through a frosted Soberton with two panting soon to be walked dogs, Like Snowdrops You Will Shine played on the radio. I'd never heard it before. It was

a strange and haunting piece of classical music, I thought about Nancy's words and thought I must share them in the Parish Magazine, but then, after the walk, turned my attention to finding out a bit more about 'Like Snowdrops'.

It turned out this whimsical piece of music was created by Australian composer, Katia Beaugeais. There is quite a bit of plucking of strings and swirling of violins, it apparently was composed to represent the optimism of snowdrops. I did a bit of research and it turned out to be especially composed for people who are facing a challenging situation and first composed for the 2018 Hush Hospital Foundation and subsequently selected for the Australian Chamber Orchestra's 2019 worldwide playlist celebrating "Incredible Female Artists", ABC's "Best of Australian Classical Music", and re-released on ABC Classic's "2021 Women of Note" Vol. 3 album. If you are interested, you can find it on Spotify. It opens with the pretty sound of plucked strings warming up to a fuller orchestral sound. It is gentle but uplifting – rather like little snowdrops that we will soon see springing up all over our villages.

Happy watching, listening and if the mood takes you, adventuring further afield.

Guests ... in your garden

I write this after a festive season of hosting and being hosted. A few weeks of thinking of others, what do they want for presents, dietary requirements, alcohol wish lists (what is Sheridan's?) and are they being made to feel welcome.

On reflection, it's probably time to put some of this thought process into your garden. As we embark on a new year in the garden and plan out different plants that we might want to grow this year, is it time to think of who – or what – else uses your garden.

Your sanctuary is home to many different guests, some of those are invited and others may be less welcome. Slugs and snails are amongst those that cause the most upset amongst us keen gardeners. There is a multitude of potions and pills that claim to rid your garden of these 'pests' but really, do they ever cause enough damage to justify throwing chemicals on to the ground?

If only there was a more natural solution! I have witnessed some people putting beer traps between lettuces to lure the slimy invaders into a bubbly demise but you must be of a particular character to be wasting precious beer on a slug funeral.

If only there were a natural predator to these little, silky foes – like a hedgehog. Now as you read this it may still be too cold for our spiky friend to have emerged from their slumber, but it may be that they are already roaming around your garden, eating as many slugs as they can get their 'paws' on; they will have been asleep for months and will be starving by now. How do we encourage more hedgehogs to our gardens? I have not seen a hedgehog in over three years which is concerning as I'm in gardens all day, most days.

My personal recommendations:

- Purchase or build a hedgehog house.
- Put out some dog or cat food for them at dusk – just remember to discard it in the morning if untouched due to fly eggs.
- Create a wild hedge for them to hide is also a good thing you can do to encourage a hedgehog into your garden.

The time is now running out to prune your apple and pear trees and also your roses, so make this a priority on your to do list. It is also time to prune back winter flowering shrubs such as Buddleja davidii, Hydrangea paniculata and Leycesteria. It is also time for clematis groups 2 & 3 to be pruned. If you are ever in doubt, check on the RHS website.

I have saved the best to last, sowing! You can start an early sowing of sweet peas indoors, ready to be taken outside after the last frost. You can also sow hardy perennials such as echinaceas, dianthus and verbena. I would always sow at least twice as many as you actually would like. If you end up with more there will always be a grateful neighbour who would take the excess off your hands.

With all that money you save on plants, you could spend it on a second home – even if it is only just big enough for a hedgehog.

On Monday 17th March, branch member Rear Admiral David Snelson CB will present "The History of the Five Ark Royals". The talk will commence at 1900 in Droxford Village Hall with supper available on completion for those who book in advance. There will be a cash bar available from 1830. Non-members are very welcome to attend both talk and supper. Please contact robmunroscott@aol.com at least a week beforehand if you would like supper.

Ark Royal is one of the most famous ship names in history. The first was a 55-gun 500-ton galleon which served as Lord Howard of Effingham's flagship during the defeat of the Spanish Armada in 1588. The 2nd (and 1st HMS) Ark Royal was a merchant vessel converted into a seaplane carrier in 1914; she was renamed HMS Pegasus in 1934 to make way for the 3rd HMS Ark Royal (22,000 tons) and scrapped in 1950. Completed in 1937, Ark Royal 3 accumulated an impressive war record while achieving fame via Nazi propaganda which falsely claimed she'd been sunk on several occasions. She succumbed to a German U-boat torpedo on 14 Nov1941. The 4th HMS Ark Royal (44,000 tons) was the largest and last of the Royal Navy's conventional fixed wing carriers, laid down during the war and serving from 1955 to 1980. The 5th HMS Ark Royal (22,000 tons) was an Invincible Class aircraft carrier, designed to operate helicopters and Harrier 'jump' jets. Commanded by David Snelson in 2001, she served from 1985 to 2011.

David Snelson joined the Royal Navy in 1969. He was Commanding Officer of the air defence destroyer HMS *Liverpool* in 1987 and again in 1997 as Captain (D) 3rd Destroyer Squadron. He then became Director of Naval Operations and Trade in the Ministry of Defence in 1998 and Director of Naval Staff Duties in 1999 before commanding the aircraft carrier HMS *Ark Royal* in 2001. He was appointed Commander United Kingdom Maritime Forces in 2002. In March 2003, he was the Royal Navy Commander for Operation Telic, during which he led maritime operations for the invasion of Iraq from his headquarters ashore in Bahrain. He went on to be Chief of Staff (Warfare) for the Fleet in 2004 before retiring in 2006. After leaving the Navy, Admiral Snelson served as Chief Harbour Master for the Port of London Authority between 2006 and 2011. He then served as a Non-Executive Director for the Maritime and Coastguard Agency and the Port of Milford Haven between 2011 and 2018. He was elected as an Elder Brother of the Corporation of Trinity House in 2013.

Road Report

Edited by Jonty Sherwill this feature aims to raise awareness about what we can each do to encourage more considerate driving with benefits for all road users whether on foot, horseback, cycle or behind the wheel or reins. The views expressed are personal and based on 50 years of driving. Friendly feedback is always welcome.

Safe driving is no accident

I was surprised, indeed rather shocked, to learn that Hampshire has the fifth worst road accident figures of UK counties, which immediately poses the question, why? Presumably traffic density is a factor but perhaps the type of roads also. Sadly, accidents on rural roads are more likely to result in a death.

Of course each of us intends to drive safely and being vigilant for the things that cause accidents is the essence of 'defensive driving', but according to a psychologist interviewed on the BBC's World-at-One recently, over-confidence in our own driving skill can be a problem, and that speed limits are often seen as a target, not as a limit. Equally concerning is that if we see a serious accident it usually does not influence our own driving, the assumption being that accidents will always be someone else's fault.

While one cannot anticipate the misjudgment of another driver, by reducing our speed and thinking one step ahead for potential hazards and varying road conditions, possibly ice, leaves, gravel, potholes, it could help avoid an accident, and by adhering to village speed limits and slowing down when passing parked vehicles and delivery vans. Rule 163 of the Highway Code is prescriptive on these scenarios and well worth a fresh look, and available to read online: https://www.gov.uk/guidance/the-highway-code

The road safety message

Years ago the BBC would broadcast public information films on various topics, most not much longer than an ITV advert, but that hardly ever happens nowadays, if at all. How odd then, or so it seemed to me, to hear a road safety message on the DAB radio station 'Mellow Magic', Vicki's preferred listening choice when she's driving. Its repetoire is nothing like Radio 3 but it does make a refreshing change to my more customary diet of Rameau and Resphigi!

The benefit of radio listening?

Music in cars has been part of my motoring experience for many years, with my father in the motor trade driving smart new Austins, Rovers, Triumphs, MGs and Jaguars, most of them with the latest generation of in-car entertainment. In the late 1960s 8-track 'Slot Stereo' was the new tech and en route to sailing every Saturday Beethoven's 5th Symphony or Chabrier's Espagna would be playing, and so began my passion for classical and other music.

Dad used those cars to their full potential but thankfully never crashed any, good concentration and 'road craft' were his allies, and I sometimes wonder if his love of listening to music was also part of it.

Years later BBC FM Radio would become my staple listening for the daily commute to work, Radio 4 for news, Radio 3 for classical music with its knowledgeable and unflashy presenters. In 1992 the novelty of Classic-FM arrived with shorter snippets of music, chattier presenters and those sophisticated adverts, at least before it became too popular!

The dear old 'Beeb' had to respond but it tookthem five years to find the right presenter for their mixed-tape 'In Tune' programme at 5pm each weekday. Sean Rafferty would soon became an institution, equally revered by musicians and listeners for his generous Irish chat, live studio performances, and the championing of new virtuosi. Then, just before Christmas after 27 years of service, like other favourite notable presenters, he was removed in a programming revamp. His final edition of In Tune, just a few weeks ago, was a fitting tribute, an uproarious if poignant occasion with live contributions from past protégés.

Co-option of New Parish Councillors

The PC announced in December that it was seeking to fill two vacancies on the Parish Council and sought interest from residents of the Parish. We had a number of qualifying applicants and the full PC will decide which two of the candidates it will invite to join the council at its February meeting. The PC will close the nomination for applicants at the end of January. The process for co-option allows for all the candidates to speak for a few minutes to the February Meeting and following this the council will hold a secret ballot with the successful two candidates being asked to join the PC for the March meeting.

Parish Council Budget and Precept 2025/26

It was agreed to set the Budget for 2025/26 at £44,530 and to set a Precept at £41,314 representing a £48.48 charge on a Band D property and approve the use of general reserves £3,216 to cover the balance of the budget. The parish precept is the contribution each and every business premises and domestic residence makes to fund the parish council through the council tax. The overall increase to the precept is 5% as the Parish Council has faced increased costs in administration and other obligations. The PC decided not to pass the full 10% increase in budget to residents as it has sufficient reserves to meet its spending commitments and supplement 5% the 25/26 budget for the next financial year.

Annual Parish Assembly 15th April 2025

The APA is a public meeting which will be held at Soberton Village Hall, 15th April starting at 7.30pm (the monthly PC meeting will commence at 7.00pm for urgent business only).

This year we have invited a series of speakers from the emergency services. Piers Rochford from Hampshire and the Isle of Wight Constabulary and part of the South East Cyber Crime Unit. Piers will give a short presentation and advise us all about cyber fraud and how we can keep ourselves safe online. He will also explain the process in the event of fraud or attempted fraud. We will also have a short presentation from Rebecca Brackwell-Slade (Trustee) about the Hampshire NHS Air Ambulance and anticipate input from the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Fire and Rescue.

This meeting will be attended by our Hampshire County Councillor, District Councillors and a member of the South Downs National Park Authority. All will be open to questions of a general nature, but it will not be possible to answer questions of a specific site/case nature. However, the relevant authority representative can make enquires on your behalf.

Email and website domain name

The parish council clerk, it's website and all parish councillors can now be contacted using @soberton-pc.gov.uk, the back page of the magazine schedules the new website and email addresses.

Recreation Ground/Children's Play area

The specialist contractor appointed to carry out works to the field of play at the Recreation Ground will commence work this spring. The work includes drainage, levelling and seeding. The children's play area (CPA) also requires considerable investment. The PC are exploring a series of options and the availability of grants to assist with the costs. The CPA is inspected regularly by third party inspectors and work will be carried out to ensure the equipment remains safe for users. This work will be carried out early in the new year.

Trees and hedges around the Recreation Ground will be pruned this winter.

The PC is considering a total review of play provision at the Recreation Ground. Initial ideas are to provide for younger children to play within the recreation ground itself using new equipment (which we hope to fund through grants). The wooden equipment behind the Liberties is becoming old and will require considerable repair within the next few years. The PC is considering how repairs can be managed or if it is possible to use parts of the existing equipment.

If you have any ideas you would like to feed into this process, please send these to the Parish Clerk. A full consultation is planned in the spring, in the interim period the WCC open spaces team are to be asked to draw up ideas/options which will assist in budgeting and grant applications.

Challenges and Changes

As the saying often attributed to Confucius goes, 'May you live in interesting times.' This sentiment feels particularly relevant today as a wave of reforms pick-up pace to reshape the foundations of local government and planning.

The Government aims to ensure Councils can sustainably provide essential services while making elected representatives more accountable. While change is necessary, it must not come at the cost of democratic fairness or effective representation. Large-scale reforms must prioritise the voices of residents and their local Councillors who understand the unique place making challenges in Hampshire and the Winchester district.

There are currently two key areas of change underway with implications for the Meon Valley - a New Planning Regime and Devolution and Local Government Reorganisation.

New Planning Regime

Planning reform centres on the revised National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) introduced in December 2024. Key changes include:

- Mandatory housing targets: Winchester District must increase housing provision by 71%. 1,157 new homes from 676 homes per year.
- Focus on affordable housing, particularly for social rent.
- Sustainable Development presumption: Stronger reasons will be required to refuse planning applications.

We also await details on other Planning Regime changes, including measures to support nature recovery, reformed planning committees, and the proposed Infrastructure Act. These reforms and unknown aspects from the proposed Devolution and Local Government Reorganisation will shape how planning applications are determined in the future.

Devolution and Local Government Reorganisation

The Government's English Devolution White Paper, published in December 2024, sets the stage for significant local authority reorganisation. Hampshire County Council will provide an 'expression of interest 'with a proposal to join Southampton, Portsmouth, and the Isle of Wight to form a Strategic Combined Authority with a Mayor. This most likely

will involve merging current District Councils into unitary authorities. Whether these proposals are accepted by the Government will be known in February/March 2025. If approved, the May 2025 elections will be deferred to 2026, and reorganisation plans will be submitted in Autumn 2025.

Sustainability, Climate and Nature Recovery
Winchester City Council (WCC) has made progress
in reducing its carbon emissions through energyefficient buildings, solar power, and land
management. However, its recent claims of
achieving net-zero emissions by excluding Scope 3
(indirect) emissions are misleading. More work is
needed to meet original climate targets.

Hampshire County Council's climate initiatives also show promise but lack clear progress data or a comprehensive plan to achieve net zero by 2050.

We're excited to share that, thanks to strong advocacy from your Councillors, Winchester City Council has agreed to develop a **Nature Improvement Plan**. This plan will focus on new initiatives to protect and improve our local environment for wildlife plus enhancing the natural beauty of our area.

Food Waste Recycling

From October 2025, WCC will introduce food waste collections for residential properties, reaching all households by April 2026. Food waste will be diverted to Anaerobic Digestion (AD) to reduce incineration and generate clean energy.

A Bright Future for the Meon Valley

As we navigate these changes we look forward to a bright future for the Meon Valley. For now, it is business as usual. Our commitment to fair representation for Meon Valley residents, sustainable growth and making our Valley a great place to live with environmental progress remains unchanged.

DEVOLUTION

The Government published its English Devolution White Paper on 16th December 2024 setting out a programme of devolution and Local Government reorganisation across England.

The vision outlined by Government is that all parts of England are to be part of regional Strategic Authorities that have a **regional Mayor**. These Strategic Authorities, working in a similar way to existing Mayoral Combined Authorities will have responsibility for driving growth and shaping public services across wider regional geographies covering strategic leadership of key place shaping responsibilities such as economic regeneration and growth, strategic planning, skills and employment and strategic transport.

Hampshire County Council could be one of the local authorities to be included in the Government's **Devolution Priority Programme (DPP)**.

At the end of August 2024, an agreement was made with the Isle of Wight Council, Portsmouth City Council and Southampton City Council, to submit to Government a joint Expression of Interest (EOI) in forming a single combined authority for the collective area of the four upper tier authorities.



Inclusion on the fast-track **Priority Programme** would be the first step towards creating a Strategic Authority across the wider region incorporating the local authority areas of Hampshire County Council, Isle of Wight Council, Portsmouth City Council and Southampton City Council.

At a meeting of the Full County Council on Thursday 9th January, followed by a Cabinet meeting on Friday 10th January, approval was given to request that the County Council be included in Government fast-track plans to bring devolution

to the area.

In addition to the creation of a new Strategic Authority, the Government is also expecting all areas across the country to produce local government re-organisation plans by Autumn 2025. This will create new large unitary authorities which, for Hampshire, will mean bringing together the County Council, 11 borough and district councils and small neighbouring unitary authorities into a number of new large unitary authorities.

Given that HCC has more than 1.4 million residents and the White Paper requires all unitaries to have not less than 500,000 in each unitary, it might mean some districts/boroughs transition from Hampshire into perhaps Portsmouth or Southampton [each currently have approximately 300,000 residents], although reassurance has been given by Government that every effort will be made not to split a district or borough.

I will keep you informed as things progress but be aware that devolution with elected Mayors is not an option, it is a route required by central Government for all local authorities. 




