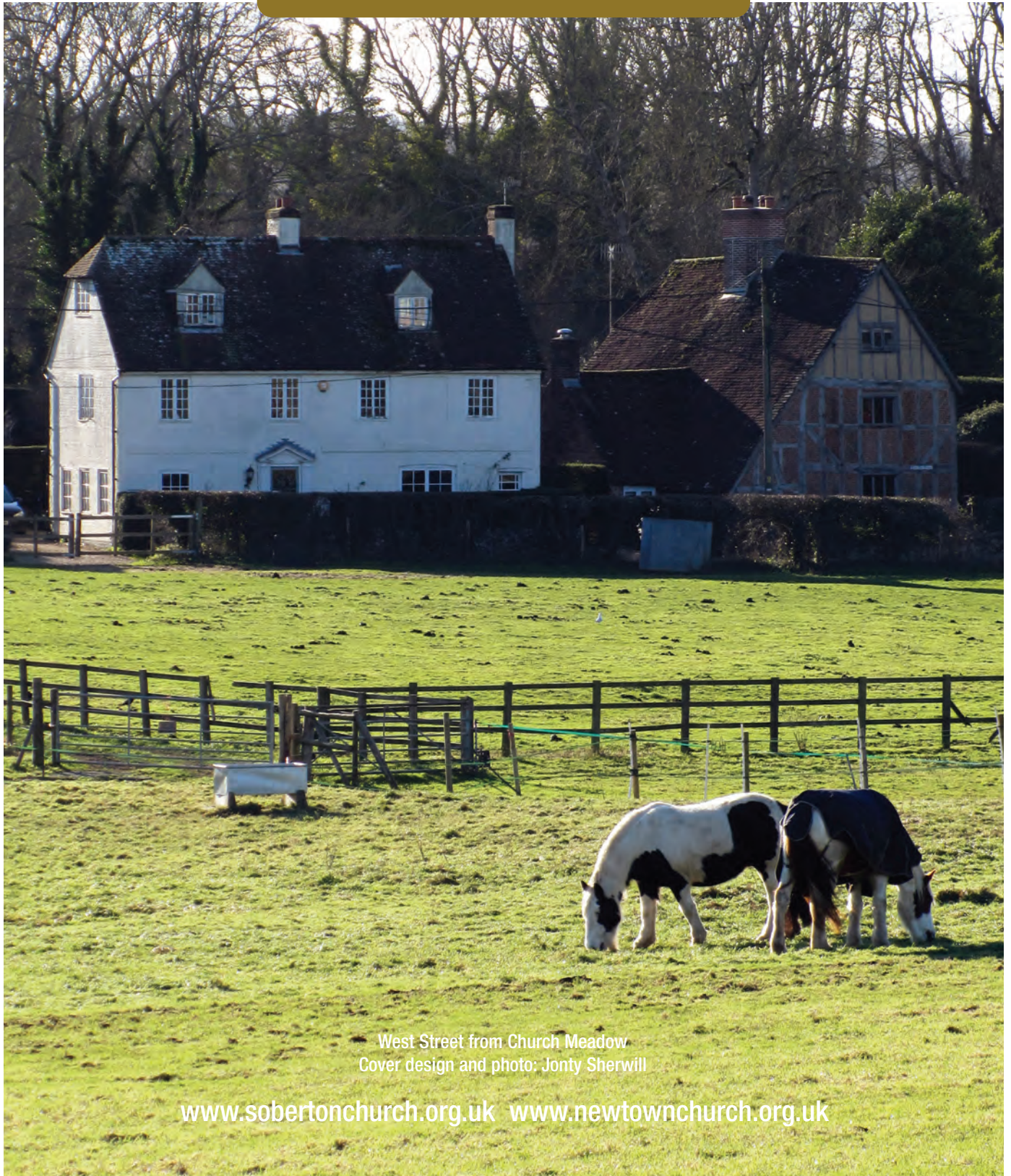

## ***Foreword ... an introduction, and welcome, to Rachel Houlberg***

Happy new Year! My name is Rachel, I live in Hambledon and started last September training to be an LLM Reader to serve the parishes of Soberton Newtown and Hambledon. This article is some of my journey to this point.

As the old year turns into the new we often turn our minds to ways of improving ourselves. I always promise myself I will get fitter physically, take more exercise, eat less chocolate, complete dry January. However improvements can come at anytime, and my spiritual revelation and resolution to improvement started in the autumn of 2024 when I started talking to Liz about the calling I had been ignoring to LLM (Licensed Lay Ministry or Reader).

I had been encouraged to start this process during a conversation with Bishop Jonathan, I could not ignore that, so started to talk to Liz. She was amazingly supportive, encouraging and affirming of my faith. She arranged for me to talk to those in our diocese who support and select candidates both for Lay and Ordained ministry. To my surprise all those I spoke to seemed to affirm the faith Liz had perceived that I did indeed have a calling to be an LLM. In May last year I found myself with eight others from this diocese at a discernment panel for LLM training. Following successful selection, I started training at Sarum College in Salisbury in September as a trainee LLM Reader. The first weekend was disorientating. I felt a strong fear that I was an imposter and was sure others would notice, but also a stronger call that I was starting something exciting and God given that I could and would achieve to bring back to this community.

Training involves weekly online tutorials with up to 10-12 hours additional study to supplement the tutorials. Modules last for 10 weeks at the end of which we produce two assignments, for this module a theological reflection and an essay on Pastoral Care both 2500 words. We attend Saum for a weekend once a module for face to face training, this is always a highlight, a chance to meet with tutors and receive lectures as well as get together with the new friends and colleagues from across 4 dioceses. We are assigned to work within formation groups for the duration of the course. This is effectively a tutorial group a chance to learn in groups and support to each other. We also arrange a Local Learning Group, this is a group made up of parishioners that meets twice during a module to help reflect on the learning often related to our assignments and keep the training grounded in the locality. It is an opportunity to lead and facilitate a small group and to benefit from different perspectives and wisdom through the learning journey. Additionally I meet with the LLMs from this diocese also going through training, both from my cohort and the year above. This is a good forum for informal worship, conversation and support.

So having taken a large step out of my comfort zone I am enjoying the challenge of going back to college and learning something new, in the hope of bringing that learning back to the parishes and bearing fruit for the furthering of the Kingdom of God. All being well I will be licensed as a Licensed Lay Minister in June 2027.

## James Stevens Curl - a long Soberton connection

Distinguished architectural historian, died aged 88.

His burial was held at St Peter's, Soberton, 25<sup>th</sup> November 2025.

James Curl was a truly distinguished and notable architectural historian with numerous honours, who had no hesitation in strongly expressing his views. His obituary in the Times describes him as being 'untroubled by self-doubt'. He did not mince his words especially when critiquing modernism: 'Much architecture in the West, regrettably, has become empty, uncouth, trashy....and in artistic terms, worthless'.



Prof Curl was born in Belfast in 1937 where he obtained his degree, later moving to Oxford School of Architecture and throughout his working life was a prolific writer both of research articles and books, church architecture often featuring. He returned to Queen's University, Belfast as Professor of Architectural History in 2000. In 1995 with a colleague, Susan Wilson, he revised the Oxford Dictionary of Architecture, with over 6,000 entries, described as 'a considerable contribution to scholarship'. That all sounds rather serious, but he was also described as being 'tremendous fun', his 'coruscating comments' were often amusing, he dressed eccentrically, and was a bit of a gourmand – his favourite meal was, apparently, three dozen snails washed down with a bottle of red wine.

He planned his own funeral with care, his funeral stone has been carefully designed, as he often said that he wasn't going to have a modern mass-produced tombstone, free from any aesthetic merits or artistic qualities – they added 'new terrors to Death', no 'cultural atrocity' over his head!

But why was he so insistent that he be buried at St Peter's? Well, he is a descendant from Bishop Walter Curll, Bishop of Winchester in the 1640s during the Civil War; who was in his palace at Bishops Waltham when surrounded by a Parliamentary army and had to escape (it is said) secreted in a dung cart, to stay with his sister in the Manor House of Soberton. He died some 3 years later of natural causes (an achievement for Bishops at that time) and is buried in the church. There are memorials to the Curl family in the south transept at St Peter's and it is still called the Curl Chapel. So a nice touch, a distinguished church historian's final resting place being so close to his famed ancestor of over 350 years ago. Do visit the church and see the Curl memorials, most notably the fabulous Scheemaker memorial displaying the Bishop's sister's maiden name.

## ***In your garden ... a bumper crop – that's the tip***

Most of my January has consisted of pruning roses and soft fruits like apple and pear but now all that hard work has been completed, we are left in the hands of Mother Nature and more specifically her erratic frosts!

Most soft fruits, with the exception of figs (we'll get to that one soon) are very hardy whilst dormant over the winter months. However, in early spring -or even late winter these days – the new growth and blossom can be easily damaged by a severe frost – protection in the guise of a garden fleecing (available in most local garden centres) is recommended for up to two weeks after the emergence of flowers if said frosts threaten. Even if you can only protect a branch or two it is better than most banks have been able to achieve!

Apricots, peaches and nectarines are more abundant in the Meon Valley than you would first of imagined. Most are cordon or espalier trained to a south facing wall and produce fantastic fruits when the buds have been protected from our occasional deep frosts. Even more impressive, I am aware of a large peach tree in Corhampton which over the years I have been working in the garden, produced fist sized, juicy peaches that would rival any Mediterranean town.

One soft fruit which I have already briefly mentioned and appears in many gardens is the fig.

In all of my research over the years on various plants and practises, I have never come across one with more contradictions of how to treat it: 'hard prune in the winter months'; 'tip prune in the spring'; 'restrict the roots'; 'only play it Cliff Richard!'

The main problem occurs due to the fact that in warmer climes the fig has two fruiting seasons. The first one is in summer where a pea sized fruit has overwintered but not succumbed to frost and then been able to grow slowly and ripen in the English summer. The second season starts

where the fruit begins to form in spring and develops into a green fruit but by the time it is large enough to ripen the weather has eased into autumn so it remains as a firm green fruit.

With this in mind we can now prune with discretion, the shoots of which we do not require to fruit in early to mid spring. We can then prune in summer those shoots which have produced fruit. It is quite the balancing act to ensure the plant remains compact, contained and protected at all the right times.

In March, we should hopefully be starting to have a few days that make us feel like spring is around the corner. In preparation for this we can start cutting back herbaceous perennials and ornamental grasses. Once this is done, you can clearly see if they need to be divided – this is normally every three years. It is a great way to rejuvenate a border and produce additional plants for some of those empty spaces.

## ***Local History ... Clues to the Past all around us***

Walking around the parish these days we are most likely to be on our guard for traffic and other hazards and not have time to stand and stare. However, a moment to pause and reflect can be very rewarding and inform us about the Soberton of bye-gone days.

The obvious clues are provided by the Council in the shape of road name signs. Station Road, Chapel Road, Forester Road for example, still have buildings which gave the name to the road in which they are situated. However, it may not be long before the Methodist Chapel, like the National School on School Hill, will no longer be obvious especially if the property has a name change.

Reminders of some of Soberton's public houses are preserved in the names of property so The Hurdles, originally known as The Station Hotel, The Falcon by the War Memorial and The Plough in Forester Road (but no longer associated with Plough Lane, (did the powers that be not know the derivation of its name?)) Other connections are lost such as The Royal Oak in Liberty Road, The New Inn and The Cock and Bottle in the High Street and maybe others we do not know about.

The Old Police House on Heath Road is a reminder of the last house used by the village policeman although the policeman had been housed elsewhere within the village in earlier times. The majority of shops have become residential properties and are harder to distinguish.

Kiln Hill may not have a kiln but you may notice man's intervention on either side of the road. It is not a natural landscape, clay has been removed for brickmaking. Elsewhere in Newtown there is further evidence of brickmaking with Clamp Farm and Clamp Kiln Farm. In the northern part of the parish one can see evidence of chalk pits where chalk has been removed 'to lime' heavier ground, an early form of soil improvement.

Not all of the hollows have been made for the benefit of the local community, one large bomb crater, now a pond exists not far from West Walk car park in the forest. The large pond on the corner of Chapel Road and lesser ones near to the corners of former common land may well have been man made. In the past when estates and farms had rights to pasture animals on common land and in forests the entrances and, more importantly the exits, were often funnel shaped so that the animals could be brought together and more easily controlled. Water at these points was a necessity if the animals had been, or were about to be, driven a distance.

It is just about possible to make out the slope to the pond at the junction of Chapel Road and Horns Hill where farm carts could be backed down while containers could be filled up with water for use in the stockyard and possibly for domestic use too. Running water did not arrive until after World War Two although certain properties belonging to the Lay Family and Newtown School and Vicarage had been supplied with drinking water since the 1930's from an artesian well at Clamp Kiln Farm. Up until that time Sobertonians relied on wells and springs for drinking water.

The Meon river also was a vital resource for water, especially on the chalklands. When walking the disused railway one realises the number of bridges that had to be constructed over or under the railway line to allow access to the river. It is also possible near St. Clairs Farm to see the remains of a water wheel constructed early in the 20<sup>th</sup> century to pump water up to Cott Street.

The need to transport water and other heavy loads by horse and cart presented other problems and the steepness of the hills was paramount. Going uphill was hard enough on the horse or horses but the carter or his assistant could be ready with a block of wood or stone to put behind the wheel of a laden cart. Going downhill created a different problem with the laden cart trying to overtake the horse(s). On the left hand side of Horns Hill large stones were set at intervals so that the carter could get the wheel of the cart behind the stone and give the horse(s) a rest. As the road surface has got higher so these stones have got almost lost but with careful prodding they can still be found.

The parish does not have too many pavements but a few feet can still be seen outside of Linden Villas in the High Street there only function could have been to attract possible customers to stop on a safe paved area to view the shopkeeper's window display.

Another feature still visible in places dates to the preparation for the D-Day when our roads sheltered, beneath their trees, vehicles in a variety of shapes and sizes. Tanks, however were not designed for narrow



country roads and so the roads had to be adapted for them. Consequently, at several road junctions it can still be seen that the road has been considerably widened and in places the hardstanding which replaced the original verges.

Perhaps a little harder to be seen but still visible a few years ago was evidence of former 'agricultural' practices. The Meon did have its watercress beds and its osier beds although it was always worthwhile noticing where the cattle were grazing and watering before gathering the watercress. Traditionally cattle were kept on the clay lands of the south of the village so the beds near St. Clairs Farm may have been relatively safe.

The hedgerow near St. Clairs was also one place where it was possible to find a few hops growing. Although hop growing did not appear to form an important crop in Soberton some must have been planted and used by the local small scale beer makers. Much more noticeable fifty years ago were the daffodils growing close to the hedgerows in fields which had been used by market gardeners. Daffodils provided a catch crop before the fruit was ripe for taking to the town markets and it is understood they were frequently grown on the edges of the fields where the plough turned. The Newtown School log book referred to children picking violets and flowers for market.

**On Monday 9<sup>th</sup> March at 1900 in Droxford Village Hall, Major Hugh Frere-Cook, Army Intelligence Corps will present "Cyber – the new domain in today's armed forces". A cash bar will be available from 1830, but we are unable to offer supper on this occasion. Non-members are very welcome to attend. The talk itself is free of charge but donations to the RBL are always welcome.**

From early days of telegraphy and wireless communications, the evolution of technology has brought new challenges for armed forces across the globe. In recent years, cyber has emerged as a critical and distinct domain, fundamentally altering the landscape of both military operations and national security.

Cyber warfare refers to the use of digital attacks by one nation to disrupt the computer systems of another, often with the aim of causing damage, stealing information, or influencing behaviour. Unlike traditional combat, cyber operations can be conducted remotely and anonymously, making attribution and retaliation more complex. The increasing connectivity of military infrastructure and reliance on digital communication systems have made the armed forces particularly vulnerable to cyber threats. Unlike some conventional domains, cyber operations are characterised by rapid technological change and a constantly evolving threat landscape. Armed forces must contend with sophisticated adversaries, including hostile states, criminal groups, and hacktivists. The anonymity of cyber attackers complicates attribution, making it difficult to identify the source of an attack and respond effectively. Furthermore, the interconnectivity of military and civilian systems means that vulnerabilities in one area can have cascading effects.

Modern armed forces are increasingly integrating cyber capabilities into their overall strategy. This includes investing in specialised cyber units, training personnel in digital defence, and developing doctrines that address the unique challenges of the cyber domain. Collaboration with international partners and private sector experts is also essential, given the global nature of cyber threats and the need for shared intelligence and best practices. As technology continues to advance, the role of cyber in military operations is set to grow. Artificial intelligence, quantum computing, and the proliferation of connected devices will introduce new opportunities and risks. To remain effective, armed forces must adapt quickly, embracing innovation while maintaining robust security protocols.

Hugh Frere-Cook commissioned into the British Army in 2011. He has completed two operational tours in Afghanistan and staff appointments have included 16 Air Assault Brigade and in the Ministry of Defence. He is currently assigned to the Permanent Joint Headquarters, part of Cyber & Specialist Operations Command, since September 2024, where all overseas military operations are planned and controlled. He is tasked to understand relevant global activity in the cyber and electromagnetic domain and emerging threats to communications and information security, to support the Chief of Joint Operations and forces deployed around the world.

Even in the heart of winter, rivers, streams, and ponds are teeming with life – including with one of our most endearing and much-loved mammals, the water vole.



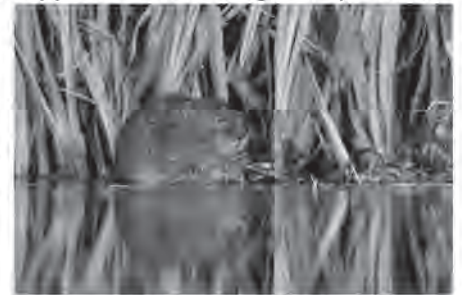
**Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust**

Known affectionately to generations as “Ratty” from *The Wind in the Willows*, water voles are Britain’s largest vole, roughly the size of a guinea pig, with a rounded body, blunt nose, small ears, and a furry tail. Their thick, chocolate-brown fur often appears almost black when wet, and their whiskered faces give them a gentle, inquisitive expression. Unlike rats, which they are often mistaken for, water voles have shorter tails, smaller ears, and a much more compact shape. They are excellent swimmers and can often be seen paddling confidently through the water or perched on the bank nibbling vegetation.

Water voles were once a common sight along riverbanks and wetlands. Sadly, habitat loss and predation by invasive mink caused numbers to plummet. However, thanks to dedicated conservation work, these charismatic creatures are slowly returning to our waterways.

Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust is helping water voles through the Watercress & Winterbournes scheme. This partnership, funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, focuses on restoring chalk streams, improving water quality, and managing riverbank vegetation to create safe habitats for water voles and other wildlife. Volunteers play a vital role in maintaining these habitats, monitoring populations, and controlling non-native predators like mink. The scheme doesn’t just benefit water voles – it supports a wide range of species, including fish, invertebrates, amphibians, and birds that rely on healthy, well-managed rivers.

Winter can be a surprisingly good season to spot them – if you know where and how to look. Even though they are less active than in spring or summer, their presence is betrayed by clear signs along the banks. Keep an eye out for neat, nibbled patches of grass with characteristic 45° angled cuts, small burrows tucked into riverbanks, and tiny droppings along the water’s edge. It’s essential to keep dogs away from the water so these sensitive mammals aren’t disturbed.



With leafless trees and shorter vegetation, riverbanks and wetland edges are more visible in winter, making it easier to spot burrows, tracks, and signs of feeding. Quiet walks along streams, ponds, and winterbournes – particularly in early morning or late afternoon – offer the best chance of glimpsing these secretive mammals. # Our drinking water needs you!

New Year bulletin from Newtown & Soberton Community and Flood Action Group



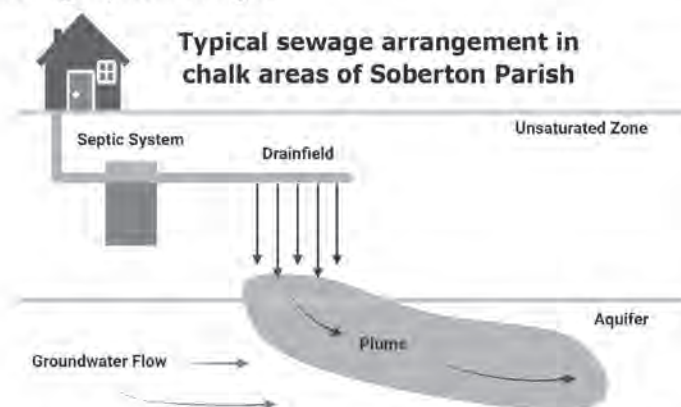
Protecting our local water quality starts at home and thanks to community action surface water quality has improved in areas of Soberton Parish with less sewage evident in ditches – but even so there will be hotspots that still need attention.

## How Water Moves Through Our Parish

Surface water from our roads and in our ditches drains to the River Meon or the River Wallington, and then onward to the Solent.

Soberton Heath and Newtown sit on clay, where more surface water flows directly into local watercourses. By contrast Soberton village and the surrounding area sit on chalk subsoil with high infiltration, effectively a big sponge and it's also where drinking water is abstracted.

Because of this, what goes down our drains matters because poor sewage and chemical management can pollute groundwater and our rivers. Old style soakaways, as illustrated below, may be illegal in some locations so check with the Environment Agency (EA) that your sewage system is legal.



Aquifers are undergoing significant changes due to climate change and overuse, affecting groundwater levels and recharge rates. Changing rainfall patterns, heavier rainfall events, fewer low-intensity rains, and more frequent droughts are reducing groundwater recharge with over-abstraction leading to subsidence and contamination of freshwater wells. These trends threaten the eco-systems that depend on groundwater, highlighting the urgent need for sustainable water management. We can all do our bit to reduce pollution - find out whether your property lies above a chalk aquifer or within a **Groundwater Source Protection Zone - check DEFRA MAGIC maps: <https://magic.defra.gov.uk/>**

## What goes down your drain matters - Do's and Don'ts - some Quick Reminders

### Do:

- Use non-biological, low-phosphate products
- Spread washing through the week
- Flush only toilet paper
- Service and empty systems as required

### Don't:

- Flush wipes, sanitary products, nappies or cotton wool
- Use antibacterial or harsh chemical cleaners
- Dispose of fats, oils, medicines or chemicals down drains
- Discharge large volumes of water at once

## Small changes at home make a big difference - use less water:

- Don't leave taps running
- Use full loads in washing machines and dishwashers
- Reduce water used for cleaning
- Consider buying second-hand or upcycling - most water use is linked to producing new goods
- Report water main leaks—always

## A Sobering Fact:

Every 10 days our parish uses and discharges the equivalent of an Olympic-sized swimming pool of water.

## Solutions:

For areas built on clay soil and with non-soakaway closed cesspits, many households have invested in a sewage treatment plant or retrofit cesspit system. These pumped air systems eject clear water but ideally need a running watercourse to carry it to a river catchment - seek advice from the EA. While requiring occasional desludging, regular annual maintenance is essential, plus a strict regime of what not to put into it - see above.

Working together we can all reduce water usage, cut pollution in our rivers and ditches, and protect nature.

*If a ditch near you is smelling of sewage then something is wrong - talk to your neighbours to identify the problem and to agree a solution*

## **Mayoral Elections and Local Government Reorganisation**

The local government elections, including those for Soberton Parish Council, will be held on 7th May 2026. These elections will not include the election of a Mayor for Hampshire which has been delayed to May 2027.

Local Government Reorganisation: proposals by Hampshire County Council, the District Councils and Unitary Authorities across Hampshire have been submitted to central Government. There was a further agency consultation (this includes from the Parish Council) during December 25 /January 26. The decision as to how Hampshire will be divided and governed will be made by March/April 2026 by central Government. The new authorities will hold elections in May 2027 with the new authorities shadowing the existing District Councils/Unitary Authorities until April 2028 when the new authorities will take over all services (when the current District Councils /Unitary Authorities will cease to exist). At present these proposals do not impact Parish Councils.

## **Soberton Parish Council Elections 7th May 2026**

It is important that the Parish Council (PC) evolves and attracts new councillors. If you live or work in Soberton Parish (or live within three miles of the parish boundary) and are of voting age you may complete a nomination form. Please contact Cheryl Gosling the parish clerk ([clerk@soberton-pc.gov.uk](mailto:clerk@soberton-pc.gov.uk)) who will have the nomination papers for distribution in February/March '26. By being a parish councillor you help decide on the priorities and policies of the PC, how we distribute funds (small grants), oversee the maintenance of our open spaces, comment on planning applications and plenty more. The PC has a number of functional duties and in addition can also be an extremely effective pressure group.

The Parish Council meets once a month on a Tuesday evening (except August), alternating between Rookesbury Hall and Soberton Village Hall. If you are interested please speak to the Parish Clerk or a councillor. It is important to have more nominations than seats available on the PC as this will generate an election. This allows residents through the ballot box to choose who represents them as a Parish Councillor.

The Parish of Soberton is divided into two polling areas:

- XU Soberton (Newtown) which elects 8 parish councillors. It comprises the central and southern part of the Parish of Soberton including High Street Soberton, Webbs Green, Selworth Lane and Tapland's Corner; Soberton Heath which includes Maybush Lane, Chapel Road, Heath Road, Forester Road; Newtown which includes Liberty Road, Church Road, Lodge Hill, Ingolfeld Lane and Dradfield Lane; plus other areas such as Martins Corner, One Hundred Acres, Hoe Gate and Kingsmead.
- XT Soberton (Soberton) elects 3 parish councillors. This area comprises the northern part of the Parish of Soberton which includes West Street, Long Road, School Hill and Station Road, plus Brockbridge, Wallops Wood and Grenville.

For clarity, the polling boundary does not follow the National Park boundary.

## **CIL applications from SDNPA**

Two applications for CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) funds have been made to the South Downs National Park Authority. The trustees of Soberton Village Hall have applied for funds to install Solar Panels with Battery storage and the PC has applied for funds to upgrade the areas of the recreation ground outside the football pitch to including an all weather circular path and add a young children's (3-13 years old) play area, and other items such as seats, picnic tables etc. The online survey issued in December 2025 will guide decisions as to the infrastructure that will be delivered at the Recreation Ground. Both applications will be considered by the National Park Authority in the spring.

## **Drains and Watercourses**

Road drainage is generally dealt with across the Parish by Hampshire Highways, all other drainage albeit foul or surface water is the responsibility of the land owner/ tenant. It is incumbent on us all to allow free drainage across our land. There are many watercourses in the Parish and any blockages may effect others upstream. It is therefore important that water flows freely. In many cases this includes the ditches adjacent to roads and lanes where blockages can occur, particularly where driveways and tracks cross roadside ditches. If you are impacted by a blocked drain Hampshire County Council's Flood and Water management team can assist and can be contacted via the parish clerk.

## Local Democracy at a Crossroads: What Local Government Reorganisation Could Mean?

Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) is the Government-led process of replacing the current mix of councils with fewer, larger unitary authorities. Alongside this, a Mayoral Combined County Authority (MCCA) is a new regional body led by an elected Mayor, taking on some strategic powers such as transport and economic development.

As LGR moves from theory to reality, it is worth considering what this may mean for Central Meon Valley settlements. Scepticism is not a refusal to modernise; there are legitimate questions: who benefits from change, and who might be left carrying unintended costs?

Local democracy has long depended on deep local knowledge. District councillors know their patches — flooding lanes, pressured land and planning issues, and the subtle social geography of village life. LGR, with fewer councillors covering much larger areas, risks weakening that connection. More services delivered at scale, and more decisions taken further away, could mean less direct representation and a reduced sense of place.

There are potential benefits. Larger unitary authorities may be better placed to tackle challenges that ignore parish boundaries: climate and nature resilience, infrastructure and housing delivery, and adult and children's social care. An MCCA could also bring strategic focus on "big ticket" priorities such as transport, skills, and investment. With local government finances under sustained pressure, consolidation may help protect essential services that might otherwise be cut.

The challenge is ensuring that efficiency does not come at the expense of local voice. Continuity of representation will change. How democratic engagement at parish level is strengthened — rather than sidelined — remains an open question. Will parish councils become more influential partners in shaping place, or will they be left managing rising expectations with fewer levers and limited support?

Another tension lies in alignment. District priorities rooted in local character will need to be merged with wider unitary agendas covering larger and more diverse areas. At the same time, parish-level concerns must still cut through and influence decisions at scale. A "One District" mindset does not automatically become a "One Unitary" community unless relationships, trust and communication are actively maintained.

This also lands on residents. Digital platforms, online consultations, and automated services can be convenient and empowering, but they can exclude those who are less confident online. Technology (including AI) may help translate local insight into large-scale decision-making — or it may further distance power from people if transparency and accountability are weak. Supporting the vulnerable, elderly and digitally excluded will be a critical test of success.

Your District Councillors will closely scrutinise the LGR process as it begins in 2026, including the first Programme Board in February, ahead of the Government's March decision on the LGR model to be implemented across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight by May 2028. An MCCA will be implemented at the same time.

LGR is not just an administrative exercise. It is a test of whether we can embrace change while keeping democracy rooted in place. Asking tough questions now is not resisting progress — it is how we make sure progress works for our communities.

From falls detectors and GPS trackers to smart speakers, TEC helps people live safely at home. Over 14,300 residents now use TEC, and more than 47,000 have benefited over the past 12 years, making Hampshire one of the UK's largest providers

Meals on Wheels - delivering 120,000 meals annually, combining nutritious food with welfare checks to help prevent hospital admissions and reduce reliance on carers

Carers Support Service – nearly 6,000 referrals in nine months, offering vital help to those caring for loved ones.

Occupational therapy and reablement – with a 99% satisfaction rate these services help people regain independence and reduce longer term social care costs

Borrow a blood pressure monitor from your local library for free. Hampshire residents can now borrow a blood pressure monitor from their local library alongside books and magazines. It is a simple, no-cost way to stay informed about your health and gives you the opportunity to measure your blood pressure in the comfort of your own home.

High blood pressure (or hypertension) affects more than one in four adults and often goes unnoticed, yet can lead to serious health issues such as strokes, heart attacks and kidney disease. By knowing your numbers, you can take the necessary steps to maintain or improve your health.

How it works

- [Join your local library](#) for free, either online or in Branch.
- Borrow a monitor for up to 14 days at a time, available on a first-come-first-served basis.
- Follow the easy-to-understand instructions included with each device.
- Return the monitor when your loan period ends.



With each blood pressure monitor there is a handy user guide which explains how to use it, as well as how to understand the results.

### Support for Parents and Babies

Your local library is a hub of support for new parents and babies during their first twelve months and beyond. There are free drop-in sessions which are perfect for parents and carers with newborn babies. You will meet other parents of babies (up to crawling age) and support each other as your children grow. There will also be a range of sensory equipment to explore with your baby.



### Citizens Advice at Waterlooville Library - Every Wednesday 1 pm to 3 pm

Citizens Advice volunteers are there for you every Wednesday to try and help you with any legal, consumer, housing, or other issues you might be facing. No need to book, just drop in. There are also many Clubs eg Whist, Scrabble, Needlecraft, Chat About and Health Wellbeing Clubs.

### Home Library Service

If you can't get to the library due to ill-health, disability or caring responsibilities the library can come to you. We can arrange for you to have your library books delivered to your home on a regular basis. We offer books in standard and large print and also have a wide range of audio books in different formats. If you would like to borrow a particular title from Hampshire's stock, we can get it for you.

*This service is free.*

After you have completed the enquiry form we will contact you by phone or email to assess your eligibility. We deliver the service through a team of Library volunteers. We will match you with someone and make them aware of what you like to read. They will visit you and exchange the items you have borrowed usually at least once every 4 weeks. ### Unwanted junk mail

Direct advertising mail can be a great way to find out about special offers, but if you would like to reduce the amount you receive, there are a couple of services which can help you.

- Royal Mail's Opt-Out Service - <https://help.royalmail.com/personal/s/article/How-to-opt-out-of-advertising-mail> - stops all unaddressed mail being delivered to you. Please note that these services will not stop mail addressed to "The Occupier", mail from companies you have previously done business with, or information from central or local government bodies.
- The Mail Preference Service - <https://www.mpsonline.org.uk/> - lets you choose which companies can contact you through addressed mail.
- Avoid generating unwanted mail by checking small print carefully and not inadvertently opting to add your name to any 'third party' mailing lists when filling in forms or making online purchases.
- Your local council - <https://www.gov.uk/contact-electoral-registration-office> - holds two versions of the electoral register – a compulsory register which is used for polling, and an edited version. The edited register is available for purchase by mailing companies, but you can choose not to be on it. If you don't want your details to appear on the edited register, you must tick the box on the voter registration form to be excluded.

The wedding of Philippa of Lancaster and John I of Portugal

**Above** -The Newport family were Lords of the Manor of Soberton in the 15C & 16C and played an important part in the development of the village. The Manor was leased to Richard Newport by Beaulieu Abbey in 1411. Richard had been highly thought of in Royal circles and was charged with escorting John of Gaunt's daughter to Portugal to marry King John of Portugal in 1387 (above) **Below** - the Newport tomb in the Lady Chapel of St Peter's (Curll Chapel) The second Richard Newport was a lawyer employed as a Royal servant, recommended by Bishop Beaufort, whose stained glass coat of arms can be seen in the chancel. His son, John Newport, was Lord of the Manor 1477 - 1521 but died childless. He built today's Church Tower and donated 2 church bells which are still rung today!
